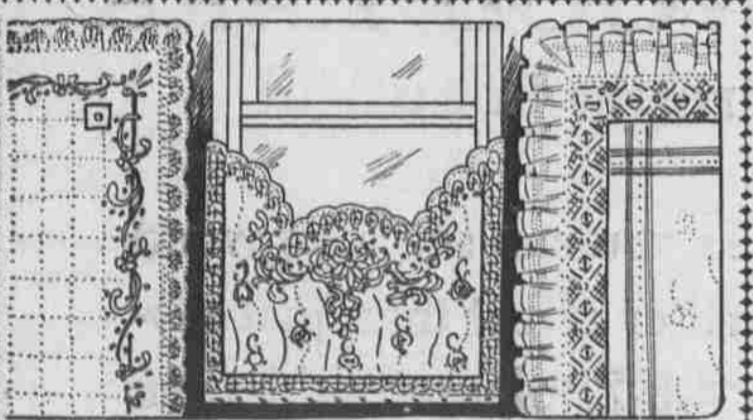

**SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN OPINIONS**

In a lengthy opinion rendered yesterday afternoon, the supreme court affirmed the circuit court of Douglas county in the case of Charles Chauncey against H. Wollenberg and some 300 other defendants, all of them property owners in the city of Roseburg.

Chauncey claimed to be one of the missing heirs of Aaron Rose, the founder of Roseburg, and contended that he was entitled to two thirty-fifths of the Rose donation claim. The supreme court held that the long
