

## WHAT WAS SEEN IN THE AUDIENCE AT COLLEGE PLAY

COLORS THAT RIVAL A DUTCH  
TULIP BED—PRETTY FACES  
UNDER ODD HATS—GIRLISH  
FROCKS OF PICTURESQUE  
STYLE—LINGERIE COLLARS  
AND FIXINGS.

At an amateur play by a college dramatic club, given in the ball room of a fashionable hotel, the vivid colorings in the hats and dresses recalled the brilliance of a Dutch tulip bed. Coral tints and king's blue and the shouting greens of the season were all in the jumble, but the young fresh faces of the girls carried off successfully many a blend that would have been fatal to the appearance of older women.

**Coral and Blue.**  
No combination is too daring. A coral silk with blue figures, had a tunic and bodice drapery of plain blue chiffon, with a sash of coral satin ribbon. Hat in poke shape of black Ta-

double faced silks, with the under side in vivid blue or green tones of ten repeated in reverses, and piped trimmings that were delightfully youthful in effect.

**Lingerie Coat Collars.**  
Where a girl was in one of the popular coat suits of fine serge in blue, black or lighter shades, she most invariably wore with it a wide sailor collar of hemstitched scrim, or lace trimmed batiste—a notable fad just now. Embroidered linen is also much used for these coat sets, and often the collars are cape like affairs, and the cuffs four or five inches wide. These do much to add variety to a single suit, or to transform one that has been worn. Some of the collars form a deep point in the back reaching almost to the waist, and this is often finished with a long tassel of silk or linen thread. This type of collar is usually of crash embroidered in a melange of color, in small set designs such as are used on waists.

**Marquessette Waists.**  
Waists of cotton Marquessette in peasant cut have more or less elaborate patterns embroidered on the goods. Sometimes just a simple design at the top of the sleeve ends, but often a very elaborate banded

gal straw, the crown made up of coral blossoms topped with an upstanding bow of blue velvet. Almost every hat one sees, has a velvet bow, or velvet facing or both.

**Blue and White Voile.**  
Another frock of blue and white striped voile, had flouncings of white voile on the skirt, three of them, each topped with a running of blue ribbon that ended in a bow in front. The bodice had a fichu of the same triple flouncings edged with blue ribbon and a girle of blue satin with a pump bow of the same in front.

**Odd Coats.**  
No end of odd shaped coats were worn, some short, some long, some with sleeves, some without. There were short fronts and long tailed backs that looked like sashes, and many wraps built on the perline and fichu lines. Materials were as varied as cuts. Black satin, colored chiffon and Marquessette, Surah weaves, changeable taffetas, and

pattern done in heavy padded embroidery and the large French knots that so successfully imitate beaded effects. Coral, and blue and yellow, with black outlining the figures are often used together, but very pretty waists come in two color ones for those who find the Russian combination garish. Cluny and Irish laces and beadings are used with these waists, and the girl clever with her needle can get up stunning bodices at little cost either of money or time, for the embroideries go quickly and materials are not expensive.

**Graduation Frocks.**  
Many of the prettiest frocks to be worn for graduation this year will be made of this same material embroidered in white or in delicate pinks or blue or lavender. One of the freaks of the years fashions is the way the young girls have adopted thellac and purple tints that were formerly relegated to older women. The hat of weaves, changeable taffetas, and
