RELATIVE TO EXTRADITION APPLICATIONS

Two new rulings have been made by Governor West relative to applications asking for the extradition of prisoners from other states, and blanks containing these and also the old rules and regulations are being forwarded to the district attorneys of the various districts in the state today.

One of the new rulings provides that each application must be accompanied by a duplicate certificate of the district attorney of the district in which the offense is alleged to have been committed, showing all the material circumstances, together with his opinion upon the expediency of allowing the application; also by duplicate certificates of the county clerk showing the official character of the magistrate before whom the complaint was made. When application is made by a deputy district attorney, there must be a certificate of the county clerk as to the official character of the deputy.

The other new ruling is to the effect that requisition requests by mail will be given immediate attention and, if issued, the requisition will be sent to the officer making the request, or the agent named, at any designated address.

HORSE'S LEG BROKEN IN RUNAWAY

There was a bad runaway this morning about 11:30 that wound up with a badly smashed wagon, and a broken-legged horse.

Fred Stelner, who owns and was driving the team, is engaged in delivering milk to patrons in the city, getting his supply at the Capitol Creamery. This morning at the hour named, he was driving west on State street, and as he turned into the alley west of the Bureau saloon, the fifth-wheel broke, and the wagon pulled in two, the front of the bed dropping, and the front running gear pulling out from under it. This frightened the horses, and pulling away from the driver, they dashed through the alley to Ferry street, turning east and running at top speed down Ferry to near High, where they ran into the sidewalk, and the near horse, a pretty little brown mare, fell. She was dragged some distance by the other horse before he was caught, and it was then found that her right hind leg was broken below the knee, and in fact nearly cut off. She was hurt so badly that it was necessary to kill her. This is the second accident Mr. Stelner has had recently, he driving off the culvert on Waller street during the high water last winter.

DIETZ WILL APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT

Hayward, Wis., May 19.—Assisted by three attorneys, Mrs. John F. Dietz, wife of the defender of Cameron dam, is engaged today drawing up papers for an appeal from her husband's conviction on a charge of having murdered Deputy Sheriff Oscar Harp while resisting arrest in his cabin last October.

Mrs. Dietz made the announcement of her determination to appeal after visiting her husband at the state penitentiary at Waupun, where he is beginning a term of life imprisonment.

CONGRESSMAN BOOHER FAVORS THE RECALL

Washington, May 19.—Congressman Booher of Missouri, replying today to Representative Kahn's speech in the house yesterday, took up the cudgels for the initiative, referendum and recall. Booher denied the statement of Kahn that the recall would be a menace.

"There never was a time," he said, "what more than 25 per cent of the people would have signed a petition for the recall of Washington, Madison, Jefferson, Lincoln or Roosevelt or any of the presidents mentioned by the gentleman from California."

Booher also devoted some time to a discussion of the Standard Oil decision, roundly criticizing the dictum of the United States supreme court.

JIMMY BRITT AND NELSON TO COME TOGETHER

New York, May 19.—Looking as chipper as ever, James Edward Britt stepped ashore here today and immediately announced that he was going to try again for the lightweight championship of the world.

"Before I go after Wolgast," said Britt, "I want a return match with another former champion—Bat Nelson."

A message was received here today by Harry Pollock matchmaker of the Twentieth Century club from Battling Nelson, authorizing him to arrange a match for Nelson with Britt for September, so it looks as though the old rivals will be seen in action again.

Britt brought an offer to Jack Johnson from Hugh McIntosh of \$20,000 for a match with the winner of the McVey-Langford bout.

OREGON ELECTRIC WILL "DRAW PLANS"
1300 Oregon Corporations to Be Filed
Portland, Or., May 19.—Thirteen hundred corporations in Oregon have failed to comply with the provisions of the new corporation tax law and are facing prosecution at the hands of the federal government. They are subject to a fine of from \$1,000 to \$10,000 and the United States district attorney's office is preparing to push the cases vigorously.

For the last two or three days representatives of the various companies in arrears have been calling at the United States attorney's office with offers to compromise by payment of the tax the penalty of 50 per cent and a cash penalty in addition but as yet no basis of compromise has been agreed upon by the attorney-general in Washington and unless one is reached, the suits will have to be instituted against those who have failed to comply with the law.

The new corporation tax law giving corporations until March in which to file statements of their business with Collector of Internal Revenue Deane. Those showing a net income greater than \$5,000 annually were compelled to pay a tax on this income. Failure to return the statements and to pay the tax by March 1, led the corporations liable to suit to collect the tax, 50 per cent of the tax in addition and a penalty of from \$1000 to \$10,000.
