TRUNK FULL OF SMUGGLED JEWELRY WARE

Washington, May 27.—A trunkful of smuggled jewelry, valued at \$20,000, said to be the property of William and Maude Rogers, which was confiscated by the San Francisco customs officials, was today ordered released by the officials of the United States treasury department, following representations that the gems were stolen in that country.

Rogers and his wife are now in custody and will be held for the New Zealand officers, who will take them back to that country for trial. The jewelry will be returned with them as evidence in the case.

Madero Is Supreme in Mexico.

El Paso, Tex., May 27.—Francisco Madero gained his first victory in the state legislature today when the Coahuila legislature, acting under orders from Provisional President De Labarra, elected Senator Carranza, the Madero candidate, governor of the state to succeed the deposed Diaz governor.

De Labarra has instructed his officials to recognize the following provisional governors:
Manuel Bonilla, of Sinaloa.
Jose Maria, of Sonora.
Abram Gonzalez, of Matamoros and Chihuahua.

These officials probably will be installed this evening or Monday. With them in power Madero will be free to go to the capital, which he probably will do on Tuesday.
