IMPRESSIVE SERVICES.

the ladies' organizations marched to the South Commercial bridge and scattered flowers on the waters in honor of the sailor soldiers who gave up their lives on the high seas that the nation might be preserved.

Afternoon Program.

The feature of the afternoon program was the parade and an address at Marion Square by Hon. Wallace McCamant, the brilliant lawyer and orator of Portland.

The parade formed at 2 o'clock with the right resting on Ferry and Liberty streets and was led by C. L. Dick, marshal of the day. Following him came the standard bearers and then the Salem Military band and Company M. Then followed the members of the G. A. R., the ladies' organizations in automobiles and the veterans of the Spanish-American war.

The parade lead west on Ferry to Commercial and on that street to State and on State to High. Then it traveled north to Court and west to Commercial and north on that street to Marion Square where the exercises were held. The exercises consisted, besides the address by Mr. McCamant, of selections by the band, music, songs, and the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg speech.

Crowds Cheer in Seattle.

Seattle, Wash., May 30.—Holiday crowds lined the streets today and cheered veterans of the Civil war in Memorial Day parade. Soldiers from Fort Lawton, the national guard, naval militia and civic organizations brought up the rear.

Ceremonies Impressive.

Bellingham, Wash., May 30.—Two most impressive Memorial services were held here today, the first when the ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps scattered flowers on the waters in honor of the departed sailors; the second when flowers were scattered over the resting place of a score or more of miners who years ago lost their lives in the Blue Canyon coal mine and in whose memory a monument has recently been erected. The usual Decoration Day program was held in the local theater.

"To the Unknown Dead."

Portland, Or., May 30.—Grand Army posts, Spanish war veteran camps, relief corps, fraternal organizations and citizens of Portland today observed Decoration Day by participating in various programs and decorating the graves of the dead. A "monument to the unknown dead" was dedicated at the Millwaide cemetery this forenoon by the A. J. Smith Grand Army post.

During the afternoon parades were held in East and West Portland in which Civil War veterans marched shoulder to shoulder with the younger veterans of the Spanish-American war.

No Longer Marched.

San Francisco, May 30.—Escorted by regulars and National Guardsmen numbering 2,500, the 800 gray haired veterans of the Civil war marched from Van Ness avenue to the Presidio, where Memorial Day exercises were held. The veterans carried their old battle flags, as well as bunches of flowers in the muzzles of their guns. For the first time in the history of Decoration Day parades here, they did not attempt to march the entire distance.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 30.—Los Angeles and its suburbs participated elaborately in Memorial services. The dead of the Civil and Spanish-American wars, the soldiers who fell in the battles of the Philippines and the heroes of naval engagements were all remembered. Probably the most impressive service was held at Venice, where flowers were cast upon the waters of the Pacific in honor of the sailor dead. In Los Angeles monster memorial services were held at the Temple auditorium and in Central Park. For Sale— Strawberry crates and hallecks. Governor West today re-appointed Rev. Phillip Bauer, chaplain at the state penitentiary. At the session of the last legislature an act was passed providing that the Catholic church should also be represented by a chaplain at the state prison and pursuant to it the governor appointed Father A. Moore to represent that denomination.

Appoints Tubercular Board—

Governor West this forenoon appointed Dr. E. A. Pierce, of Portland; Geo. F. Rodgers, of this city; and Leslie Butler, of Hood River, as members of the state tubercular board. All the members, save Butler, are reappointments. By an act passed by the last legislature, Dr. Andrew Smith, president of the state board of health, and Calvin S. White, secretary, are made members of the board.

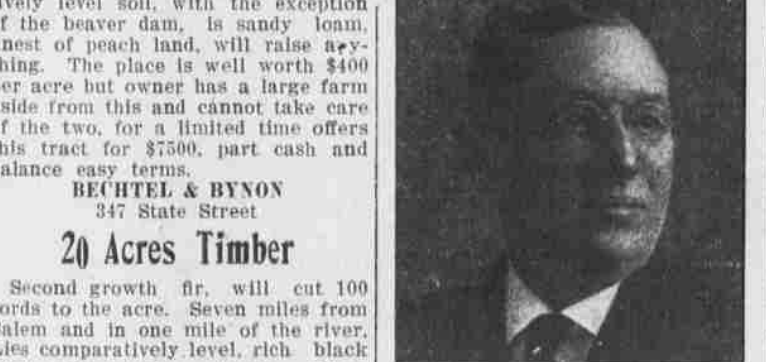
