## OFFICIALS SHOULD BE PROGRESSIVE.

The State Capitol Building Board deserves credit for being progressive, and not holding up improvements.

The board has practically acquired options on all the property in the block east of the state house grounds.

Its members have tried to meet the situation in a broad and progressive spirit, and have paid people fair prices for the grounds.

Taking it by and large they have done well to acquire that block at any fair price on which to erect the hall of justice.

If the public officials stand for progressive policies the community is benefitted and the taxpayers will not complain.

The conservative elements in any community in Oregon are quite strong enough to prevent extravagance and compel good business policies.

Public officials do a great injury to the state they represent when they take the side of mossbackism and listen to chronic kickers.

No progress is possible when citizens who are favorable to progress have to contend with public officials who take the side of the obstructionist.

## WHY THE FARMERS BACKS ARE BENT.

Secretary of State Olcott offered another department flowers for their offices twice a week, and got a sarcastic reply.

Officialism wanted to know what use were flowers if they had to stick them in glass jars and tin cans, and even cuspidors.

Secretary Olcott made very good in replying that the unlimited exchequer of the state was back of the officials to buy vases.

Officialism pronounces that "V-A-S-E-S" with a broad "A," as in the British pronunciation of "A-S-S."

It is remarkable what notions people get when they get onto salaries of from three to five thousand a year from the taxpayers.

Such is the degenerate tendency of getting on the permanent salary list—state flowers, state "V-A-S-E-S" and cuspidors.

With lazyback chairs, free flowers, janitors and assistants, is it any wonder the farmers are getting bent backs and humped shoulders digging for the ever-growing Coxey's army on the state payrolls?

Secretary Olcott deserves public thanks for his sarcastic suggestion that if they had their way the state would have to buy cut-glass "V-A-S-E-S."

## THE SHERIFF SERVES PAPERS ON HIS BROTHER

Sheriff Minto was called upon to serve papers on his brother, Douglas Minto today in the condemnation suits of the Oregon Electric railroad for right of way through his property on Mission street. Mr. Minto offered to arbitrate but that was refused. He offered to let the company pick two men and he, two, and take Chas. L. McNary of McNary Brothers, who are attorneys for the company, as the fifth man. He then offered to pick one man, the company to pick one and the two, if they could not agree, to pick a third man and leave it to the three men to assess the damages. But all offers to make an adjustment were refused and he was served with papers and will have Carson & Brown for his attorneys. The lawyers for the corporation are Carey and Kerr, Harrison Allen and McNary Brothers. The company through its right of way agent first offered Mr. Minto \$3500 and then \$5000, both being turned down. The property is crossed for nearly 400 feet.

"Handy Hints on How to Secure an Auto License" will be the title of a pamphlet which Secretary of State Olcott is planning to issue soon for the benefit of owners and operators of automobiles.

Since the new automobile law went into effect the secretary of state has literally been deluged with letters asking for information as to it, and in addition burdened with scores of incorrect applications for licenses, and the book will be designed to answer the former, and to make the law on the subject so plain that there will be no need for any errors creeping into the license applications. Just the other day the secretary received an application from the Ford Automobile company in which the signatures to the affidavit were typewritten, and because of that has to be returned. Scores of applications have been returned recently for failure to comply with the law in various respects.

## TAFT IS NEAR COMING TO SILVER BASIS

## THE OREGON SYSTEM IS FERMENTING

Asserting that the initiative, referendum and recall laws will be the main issue in the coming election in the state of Minnesota, Frank M. Eddy, of Sauk Center, of that state, has written Secretary of State Olcott for information as to the working of the law in this state and also as to the working of what is termed the "Oregon System" of government in general.

In asking for information on the subject he has submitted 22 questions for the secretary of state to answer and also asks that he be supplied with a sample of the last election ballot, and any further information possible. He states that he was a member of congress from 1895 to 1905, and that he was well acquainted with the Oregon delegation in congress.
