BANDITS ARE HIDING IN COOS COUNTY

Portland, Or., June 22.—Despatches received here today from various towns in Douglas and Coos county indicates that the hunt for the bandits who robbed the mail on the Shasta limited has narrowed down to the thickly timbered region between Ash and Loon Lake in Northwestern Coos county. The posse from Yoncalla which now numbers less than a dozen men is searching the district working westward, and three deputies from Marshfield are working northward toward Ash. From the knowledge of the county displayed by the bandits, it is believed that the desperadoes are residents of Southern Oregon.
