have entered actively upon their duties.

CHECK PASSER IDENTIFIED.

Man Held at Roseburg Said to Have Had Record in Idaho.

Roseburg, Or., July 13.—That B. B. Stewart, recently arrested at Jacksonville and returned here for trial on a charge of passing a worthless check, has passed much spurious paper in Idaho, is the declaration of W. H. Davidson, a banker of Boise, Idaho, who is passing his vacation in Roseburg.

After seeing a photograph of Stewart, Mr. Davidson said he was one of the shrewdest men the Idaho officers have had to contend with in years. Stewart is said to be a registered pharmacist and well educated.

Albany, Or., July 13.—After living in single blessedness for half a century, Miss Winifred Wilson, aged 51 years, a seamstress of this city, became a blushing bride yesterday when she was united in marriage to Martin L. Adams, a retired minister of Corvallis, aged 67. The ceremony was performed at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon at the Linn county court house by County Judge J. N. Duncan. They will make their home in Corvallis.

QUARRELED WITH WIFE, SUICIDED

Worry over divorce proceedings, which his crippled wife had instituted against him as the result of a quarrel over money matters several days ago, Alfred J. Gantner, aged 36, a real estate agent, cut his throat Tuesday night with a paring knife at 604 Division street, his home. Gantner had come back to the house, which he had left after the quarrel, and attempted to reach an agreement with his wife, but did not succeed.

He went to the house about 8:30, and upon being rebuffed by Mrs. Gantner went into the kitchen, obtained a knife and started into the room where Mrs. Gantner was seated. She locked the door between them and went screaming to a neighbor's house. Gantner cut his throat in the kitchen, and stumbled through the back door into the yard, where he fell.

Moaning, "I loved her—loved her," Gantner was picked up and taken to the Good Samaritan hospital, where his wound was dressed by Dr. F. A. Short.

After the five-inch wound, which laid open the windpipe, was attended to, doctors attending said Gantner has a good chance to live. The wound extended nearly from ear to ear, and on account of severed arteries, almost all the blood was drained from Gantner's body before the wounds could be bound up.

LANE PREPARES FOR FAIR

County Society Will Erect Booths Selling Stalls to Concessionaries.

Eugene, Or., July 13.—Enlargement of the pavilion on the grounds of the Lane County Agricultural society for the better accommodation of the Lane county fair this fall was authorized at the meeting of the board of directors last night, and the painting of all the buildings on the grounds was also directed. This year the board, instead of renting ground for the concessions, will erect a number of uniform booths on the grounds and rent the stalls to the concessionaries.

More attention will be given this year than last to the stock exhibit, and a committee has been appointed for the purpose of interesting every owner of registered stock in Lane county to bring this stock to the county fair.

The different granges of the county have taken the matter up and already are preparing collective exhibits. The county court has signified its intention of repeating its donation of last year to the fair, the money to be used exclusively in premiums.

Difficulty over the location of the district fair for Lane, Douglas and Coos counties arose several years ago, and since then Lane county has been holding a fair of its own, each year somewhat better than the previous one, until now good grounds and track have been secured, and very creditable exhibits made. The fair this year will be held September 20-24.

POTATOES TAKE A TUMBLE IN CALIFORNIA

Stockton, Cal., July 13.—Growers of potatoes received a severe shock Wednesday when the big crop prices which have been paid the past two weeks for tubers were suddenly reduced from \$2.60 to \$1.30 a sack. Those fortunate enough to have their crop well advanced and dug in time to get the high price have made unusual profits, as potatoes can be raised at good profit at 85 cents a sack in the regular season, but it usually costs more to produce early potatoes.

The dealers and growers who have been studying the big unexpected slump in prices have different views of the cause of the break. Some say the anxiety of both to rush early potatoes on the market cut prices, while others credit the decline to the hot weather through which the tubers would have to pass if shipped East.

The unmarketed potatoes already shipped are said to have been badly damaged and many sacks were rejected. Buyers were forced out of this market, and few sales were made today.

BRASS TACKS WAS ALL IT CONTAINED

ARRESTED ON ACCOUNT OF REFERENDUM

The first arrest for forgeries perpetrated in connection with the circulation of the petitions referring the appropriations for the University of Oregon was made yesterday afternoon, when Harry Coler was arrested by George E. Constable, manager of the Burns detective agency in Portland.

Coler, after his arrest, is said to have made a confession to the officers, telling just how the wholesale forgeries were committed, and it is stated that, as a result of his confession, warrants will be issued for 10 or 12 other circulators. According to the purported confession of Coler, the circulators exchanged petitions, and then wrote several names upon it, and then it would be turned over to another to write a number of names.

It is stated by the detectives who have been working on the cases, that there are about 800 forged names on the petitions.

Judge Slater, who has been in charge of the investigation, and who will soon bring suit to enjoin the secretary of state from picking the list of the appropriation bills on the ballot, stated today that he had expected the arrests, and that he was not surprised. He further states that sufficient fraud had been uncovered to save the appropriation from being referred.

Kaolin Deposits Found.

Roseburg, Or., July 13.—According to reports received here from the mountainous districts above Peol, in Northern Douglas county, a heavy deposit of kaolin has been discovered in that locality. The discovery was made by Dr. W. E. Gillespie, of Eugene, who retired from active practice a few years ago to go prospecting.

While Mr. Gillespie has little hope that the product can be placed on the market profitably at present, he has decided to experiment, and is preparing to develop the property. It is said there is only one other known deposit of kaolin in the United States, in Colorado. The product is used in manufacturing chinaware and porcelain goods.

BECHTEN IS FOUND GUILTY OF ADULTERY

After deliberating over the evidence presented to it less than half an hour the jury in the case of Fred Bechten, charged with adultery, marched into court yesterday afternoon and returned a verdict of guilty against him. This is the second time he has been convicted, being convicted at the last term of court, but securing a new trial, because of the misconduct of one of the jurors.

Bechten's offense is alleged to have been committed with Mrs. Rule, wife of Newton Rule. Rule and Bechten were neighbors near the city of Omaha. Last winter Bechten and Mrs. Rule eloped to this state, and the husband followed, with the result that they were arrested near Mt. Angel.

Bechten is well-to-do, and will appeal the case to the supreme court. It is understood that his attorneys, Kaiser & Pogue, believe that when the case is presented to that tribunal they will be able to present to it grounds which will be sufficient to reverse the judgment of the lower court.

Deputy District Attorneys Charles L. McNary and Winslow represented the state.
