SPIRITUAL FOOD MUST BE PAID FOR

After an investigation of the law Attorney-General Crawford, at the request of the governor, has rendered an opinion that, despite the fact that the penitentiary appropriation is low that under the law the state must pay the salary of the two chaplains of the institution.

The officers were created by the last legislature, and their creation came after the general budget had been made up, and no provision was made for their salary in it. Each, under the law, draws \$600 a year, and the attorney-general holds that it must be paid, and if, after its payment, there should not be enough money on hand to maintain the penitentiary until the legislature meets, the usual course will be pursued, that of issuing deficiency warrants.

FIRE FIGHTERS ARE WELL ORGANIZED

That State Forester Elliott has his forest fighting forces organized is evidenced by the fact that already they have been summoned in various portions of the state to battle with the flames, and to each instance they have succeeded in extinguishing the fires before a great deal of damage was done.

The fire which broke in Douglas county at Camas Prairie is now under control, and so is the one which started at Marcola. The latter was started by a farmer who was trying to burn a hornet's nest. He used a coal oil in starting the fire and in a few minutes it was beyond his control, and before it was extinguished by the forest fighters had burned over 500 acres.

A fire was started also on the Blue river near the McKenzie several days ago, and another in the Alsea country, but both have now been put out.

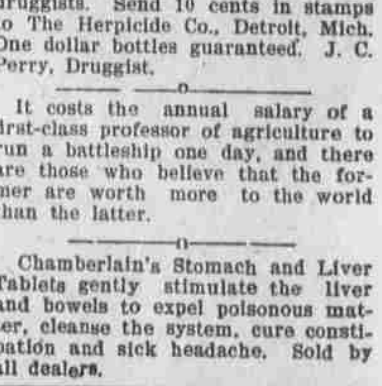
