**MYSTERY OF MURDER DEEPENS**

 Sacramento, Cal., July 29.—After two hours of careful interrogation and cross-examination of Mrs. M. Haskell, who has for two years been a visitor at the institution of Dr. Wong Him, Chinese herb doctor, in San Francisco, with whom both Sidney Cole and Anna Dudley, whom he shot on the streets, had been treating, enough evidence was adduced at the coroner's inquest today to prompt the authorities to go deeper into the case.

Mrs. Haskell, who was examined to bring to light certain facts in connection with the actions and treatment of patients at the Chinese sanitarium, which might suggest a motive for the slaying of Miss Dudley, proved an unsatisfactory witness. Apparently loth to testify at all, she evaded questions and gave answers which from time to time brought a caution from Coroner Gormley and Assistant District Attorney Atkinson, reminding her that she was under oath.

Indications are that others may become involved in the mysterious troubles which seem to have formed the background for the tragedy of last Wednesday.

"There are many things brought out in the investigation," said Coroner Gormley, at the conclusion of the first session of the inquest, "which necessitate further investigation, especially regarding the treatment Cole received at Dr. Wong Him's place."

Subpoenas will at once be issued for Dr. Wong Him, his son and his wife. They will be brought here to testify at the continuance of the inquest next Tuesday.

That Cole was a once in love with Miss Dudley was brought out by Mrs. Haskell.

**DETECTIVES HAVE STUFFED M'MANIGAL**

 Los Angeles, Cal., July 29.—That Orrie S. McManigal, alleged self confessed dynamiter, of the Lewisellyn iron works and star witness for the coming McNamara trial, believes that Harry Orchard, who occupied a position somewhat similar to his own, in the Moyer, Haywood, Pettibone case, is out of the penitentiary, is the statement made this afternoon by George Behm, uncle of McManigal.

"The Burns detectives," said Behm, "have made Orrie believe that Harry Orchard, after openly confessing to the crime of murder got off with but a few years in the penitentiary because he stood by the prosecution in the Idaho case. They have assured my nephew that his punishment will be light if he stands firm and testifies 'like a good dog' as did Harry Orchard."

Attorney Clarence Darrow left today for San Francisco, where he will join Attorney LeCompte Davis. It is understood that the two defense attorneys are working on the San Francisco end of the McNamara case.
