## THE BODY OF A.R. WEATHERBEE IS RECOVERED

FOUND THIS MORNING AT 12:30—BIG BRUISE ON HEAD EXPLAINS THE DROWNING—BODY TO BE SENT TO SAN FRANCISCO.

The body of A. R. Weatherbee, who was drowned near the Spaulding mill yesterday was recovered this morning about 11:30, it being located by H. H. Turner. Mr. Turner believing the body to be near where it went down, this morning joined in the effort to recover it, and began work at the point where Weatherbee disappeared. At the second haul of his line, to which was attached a couple of dull iron grappling hooks, he pulled up Weatherbee's apron, and at the third haul, brought up his pocket rule which being partly opened, caught on the hooks. He also felt the hooks catch on the body, but they were too dull to take hold of the clothing. A pike pole was then tried but without success.

Monte Leslie and Ira Hamilton who were dragging the slough further down, were called and with their better drag soon brought the body to the surface, it being found at the point where the accident occurred. When brought up the dead man's arms were folded across his breast. There was a big bruise on the side of the head, showing that he struck the boat as he fell, and was probably rendered partially unconscious, which accounts for his drowning, as he was a strong swimmer. The coroner took charge of the body and turned it over to the Cottage Undertaking Parlor.

He belonged to the Cherry City Lodge of the Royal Order of Moose, which has taken charge, and at the request of the bereaved wife, the body will be sent to San Francisco for interment.

## SEND WARSHIPS LOADED WITH LITERATURE

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—An American warship loaded with Panama-Pacific exposition literature and manned by Californians, may be sent to various ports throughout the world, under the direction of a commission of federal and state officials, if the board of directors of the 1915 fair can bring enough influence to bear on the navy department.

The idea was broached to the directors today by J. A. Fletcher, vice-president of exhibitors of the State Agricultural society, and received their approval. The exposition directors are hoping at least to secure a cruiser that is now out of commission if a first-class battleship cannot be made available.

## FOREST FIRES HARD AT WORK IN NORTH IDAHO


Spokane, Wash., Aug. 2.—A forest fire six miles in width is sweeping along the headwaters of Oro Idaho creek, six miles east of Pierce, Idaho, according to word sent in today by fire patrol to Superintendent Charles Fisher, of the Clearwater forest reserve. All available men in the vicinity are being rushed to the scene.

The fire is believed to have started as a result of a severe electrical storm Sunday. The smoke is so dense that forest rangers were unable to find the location of the blaze until Tuesday afternoon.

The flames are raging in the most thickly timbered sections of the White Pine belt, north fork district. It is in the domain of the Clearwater fire protection association, and Nat Brown, president of the association, has issued orders for his fire patrol to co-operate in every possible way with the state and federal rangers.

## SALMON SO PLENTIFUL THEY BLOCK CANNERIES

Portland, Or., Aug. 2.—The greatest run of salmon in years has now entered the Columbia river and the canneries on the lower river are blocked with fish, according to reports here this afternoon.

For the first time in several seasons the run is so heavy that the canneries are storing fish. The quality is the best on record.

## Fear Strike in Des Moines

Des Moines, Ia., August 2.—With 400 employees of the street car company preparing to strike tomorrow, and the company threatening a lock-out, serious trouble is feared here. The interurban company, whose lines are affected by the threatened strike, has sent to Chicago for 300 strike-breakers.

A mass meeting of citizens will be held tonight to advise the mayor how best to handle the situation.

## Failed to Fly Today

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 2.—High winds today prevented Philip O. Parmelee and Clifford Turpin, Wright aviators, from attempting their proposed flight around Pike's Peak. The aviators will make an attempt tomorrow, weather conditions permitting. To accomplish the feat, it is necessary to attain an altitude of 15,000 feet.

## Receiver for Lewis Properties

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 2.—Matthew Reynolds, a former judge of the circuit court, was today named here as the receiver for the Lewis Publishing company properties. The Union Trust company, which was first named as receiver, declined.

## New York Has 3,000,000

New York, Aug. 2.—Estimates of the board of health, as published today give New York City a population of 5,000,000, an increase of about 230,000 for the last year. The census figures for 1910 were 4,760,883.

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—A clever scheme to smuggle contraband opium from the liner Manchuria was frustrated today when customs inspectors seized \$12,000 worth of the drug, which they found in a rowboat concealed under a pier. Running from the rowboat to the liner was a line on which the 300 tons had been transferred. When the opium had been concealed aboard the vessel it not known.

## Plenty of "Dope"

Story of How Moran Clucked Them.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Grant B. Schley left a sick bed today to tell the Stanley house committee how his firm, Moore and Schley, was forced to sell the Tennessee Coal and Iron company to the steel trust during the panic of 1907.

Schley related a harrowing experience of trying to carry \$400,000,000 in loans through the financial trouble which swept the country like a storm.

The Michigan college of mines today asked the committee that George W. Perkins is expected from testifying before it on Tuesday because he is scheduled to speak at a celebration there.

The committee is considering the request.

In examining Schley, Congressman Littleton succeeded in drawing out that fact that Oliver Payne, who initiated the scheme to gobble the Tennessee company by the trust, was one of the biggest creditors of Moore and Schley, having loaned that firm \$5,000,000.

**Good Crops in Canada.**

Winnipeg, August 2.—The Free Press today publishes a crop report compiled from the reports sent in by a large number of correspondents throughout the West. From the reports the crop in the West is generally good, but rather late. It has been making fair progress, but the weather has been cooler than was altogether desirable. The reports are scattered well over the three provinces and show that very little last report was missing since the crop has gone back since the suffering from drought having recovered. Rumors apparent in the Chicago market that there was black rust in the Canadian crop were set at rest today.
