OREGON WILL EXHIBIT.

Five hundred square feet of space has been secured at the Twin City Land Show for the Oregon exhibit.

Governor West has received word from the officers of the Northwestern Development League that the business interests of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth have agreed to a deal whereby this state will be furnished exhibit space without cost at the land show.

The show, to be given under the auspices of the league, is the only one in the country which is not a private enterprise, and will be managed in such a way as to furnish space for official exhibits.

At a cost of ten thousand dollars the business interests of the three Minnesota cities have bought from the league 3500 square feet of preferred space at the show.

Each of the seven states will have a space of fifty feet long and ten feet wide for their official exhibit.

The governor has been asked to confer with officers of the league in this state and secure the interest of those necessary to put in an exhibit which will be a credit to the state.

Under this plan no one community or city will have an advantage over others in the state.

Any city, county or land company desiring to make an independent exhibit will be able to secure a limited amount of space near the state exhibit on reasonable terms, but it is the desire of the league officers for this state that the best possible exhibit be made in the name of the state, as it is from such an exhibit that results are to be obtained.

The seven states which are to be thus represented are Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, North and South Dakota and Minnesota.

No other states will have exhibits, and Canadian exhibits will be barred, the whole idea of the show being "an exposition by the seven states for the benefit of the seven states alone."

Oregon officers of the league are C. C. Chapman, of Portland, and William Hanley, of Burns.

CHICAGO HAS NO POOR.

A prominent English social worker, Prof. J. J. Findlay, has come to the defense of Chicago, after a thorough investigation of the Ghetto, the slums and tenements, says that "Chicago has

no poor" as compared with London, or any of the large European cities, or with New York.

"Of all the American cities," said Prof. Findlay, "New York alone is really right in talking of her poor problem."

Prof. Findlay is a member of the faculty of the University of Manchester, England, and was invited to deliver a lecture at the summer course of the University of Chicago on "The Lowest Strata of City Life."

He called attention to the radical differences of the causes of poverty in America and Europe.

"Poverty in the United State," he said, "is due to temporary circumstances, such as injury, death or sickness, whereas the poverty of Europe is a poverty permanent and chronic, a part of a settled life of the community."

Touching Chicago, he said: "A great deal more work has been done in Chicago than in New York for the foreign element."

STOCK MARKET IS WEEK AND PRICES DOWN

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Aug. 15.—The stock market showed a heavy tone at the opening. Canadian Pacific dropped four points and Northern Pacific 1 1/2. Reading, Amalgamated Copper and Union Pacific one. The rest of the active list showed marked declines.

In the second hour the attack on the market was continued. Union Pacific being the weak feature. Rumors that the Harriman estate had disposed of the bulk of its holdings were believed to have been responsible for the weakness in the Harriman issues. Union Pacific reached a new low record at noon with a drop of four points, and Southern Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Lehigh Valley and Amalgamated Copper made further declines. The market closed feverish. Bonds were easy.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

AND BERGER REFUSES TO PLAY BRUTE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Francisco, Aug. 15.—Refusing to admit that Jack London drew his character of Sam Steuben in "An Abysmal Brute" from the life of Jim Berger, the former manager of Jim Jeffries, and ex-amateur heavyweight champion pugilist of the world, declared his willingness to submit at any time to a comparison of his personal history and general character with that of the author.

"I am not setting myself up as a paragon of virtue, but London cannot find anything off color in my career," said Berger.

"Mind you, I am not admitting that London had me in mind when he drew his infamous character, but his twisting of names, and the pointing out of certain incidents in my boxing career would lead to many persons to believe that he did. London is overstepping an author's license, but I suppose he must keep the pot boiling, even if it be at the expense of the character of reputable persons. I do not think the picture would look well if the searchlight were turned on London's life, but I don't suppose he would care a rap what it would show.

"London knows just enough of the intricacies of the boxing game to make it possible for him to exaggerate with a seeming color of truth, and in that he is dangerous. And still I am not admitting that he means me, but if he does, he has done me a grievous wrong."

The Admiral HAS ONLY ONE VESSEL LEFT

His Last Public Appearance. Carson, Nev., Aug. 16.—Patrick Casey, who murdered Mrs. Lucy Healy in Goldfield two years ago, was hanged at 11 o'clock this morning at the state penitentiary here. Casey made an extended speech from the gallows, announcing that he had embraced the Episcopal faith. His neck was broken in the fall, and his heart had ceased to beat before the doctors in attendance could reach the body after the trap was sprung.
