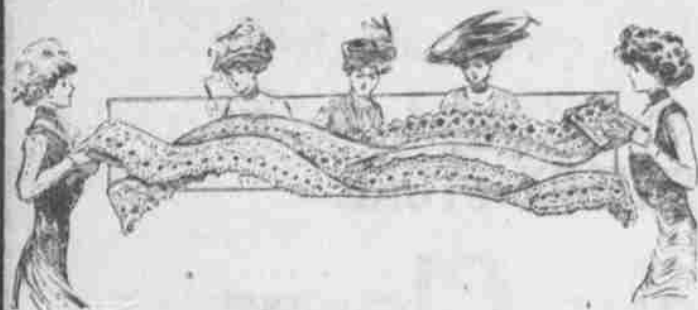

GET THREE MONTHS IN THE JAIL

LEADING MEMBERS OF THE LIVE POULTRY ASSOCIATION FAIL TO GET OFF WITH FINE, WHICH JUDGE SAYS IS NO GOOD.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Aug. 16.—Sentences of three months' imprisonment and a fine of \$500 each were imposed today upon 13 members of the Live Poultry association today, who were convicted under the state law of a conspiracy in restraint of trade. The court, in sentencing the members of the association, said that fines were not deterrent to such offenders, and that jail sentences were necessary. Former District Attorney William T. Jerome, counsel for the defendants, strongly opposed the sentence of imprisonment. Originally 80 persons were accused, but the state decided that 19 of the members controlled 95 per cent of the poultry trade, and they were accordingly indicted. Of the other six originally accused, one is ill, and has not yet been brought to trial, one case was dropped and four were acquitted.

THE OREGON MEMORIAL IS RECEIVED

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, Aug. 16.—A memorial to President Taft and congress from Governor West and 10,000 Oregon citizens, asking for the establishment of an Alaskan coal mining commission, was formally presented in the house today by Representative Lafferty, of Oregon. The memorial was referred to the committee on public lands. It will be carefully considered this winter in formulating a bill providing for the mining of Alaskan coal. The Oregon petition asks that congress enact laws providing that Alaskan coal shall be mined, transported and sold to consumers direct at cost by the federal government. Many members of the house expressed themselves as favoring the Oregon idea.

The Seattle Recall. [UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Seattle, Wash., Aug. 16.—Leaders in the movement to recall Mayor Dilling and three of the councilmen, stated today that the recall petitions probably will be filed late this week. A strong effort is being made to stop the filing of the petitions, but those behind the proposition insist that the fight will be carried to a finish.

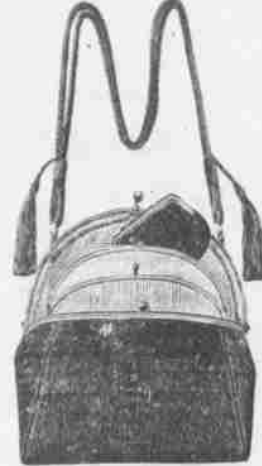
