**Funeral Held Today**—The funeral of Mrs. Mary Sappingfield, who died at the home of her son Charles, 758 N. Commercial St. Friday, August 25, was held at 11 o'clock this morning from the Liberty street residence. Mrs. Sappingfield was 82 years old. She settled at Hall plains, north of Salem, in 1816 and has lived in this neighborhood for 65 years. Her husband, who was 85 years old, died in 1903. Mrs. Sappingfield had eight great grandchildren. One of her grandchildren is Mrs. James McCourt, formerly of Salem, but now residing in Butte, Montana. Mrs. Sappingfield's oldest son, William, who was 72 years old, died in the state of Washington several weeks ago.

**Big Ranch Sold**—Colonel Hofer returned from the Yaquina Bay country today and reports the sale of the F. J. Parker stock ranch of 1133 acres for \$22,640, or \$20 per acre. It is five miles up the Big Elk from Elk City, and is one of the best stock ranches in western Oregon. This is one of the biggest land sales made for some time in Western Oregon.

**Purest Ice Cream in State**—After examining the product of six ice cream manufacturers in the state, State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey has given Claude S. Belle of 223 North Commercial street, in this city, credit for producing the highest containing the most butterfat. Ice cream offered for sale in the state must have at least 12 per cent butterfat, but Belle's had 22 per cent, thus having ten per cent more than was necessary in order to keep within the law. According to a bulletin recently issued by Commissioner Bailey containing a record of analytical and chemical examinations of foods, food products and drinks found or offered for sale in the markets of the state, Belle's ice cream ranked the highest of six examined. Three ice cream manufacturers, none of whom are doing business in Salem, were fined \$25 each for selling ice cream containing too small a proportion of butterfat. According to the bulletin from the food commissioner's office, The Belle confectionery of Salem had 22 per cent butterfat in their ice cream. Other dealers in Salem were as follows: Bligh and Fleming, 14 per cent; W. W. Zinn, 14 per cent; The Spa, 16.5 per cent. All of which, it will be seen, are far above the requirements. Salem can well take pride in this showing.

### BACK FROM A HUNTING TRIP IN COW CANYON

With plenty of game to their credit—that is as much as the law will allow, and with but one experience to mar the pleasure of the trip, Sheriff Harry P. Minto, Judge George Bligh, F. T. Wrightman, Oscar Bowers, W. J. Jones of Jefferson and Eugene Willis of Portland returned last evening from a hunting expedition in the Cow Creek country.

**Willis Gets Lost.** The unpleasant experience came when Eugene Willis got lost. He wandered away from camp, and was lost in the woods without a bite to eat for two days and a night. After scouring the woods for him the members of the party decided that he had been probably accidentally shot by hunters and had just sent a message to his relatives to come and assist in the hunt, when he rode into camp. He had wandered out of the woods and into the Canas prairie country, near Roseburg, and from that place hired a horse and guide to take him back to the camp.

**Lots of Hunters.** "We found lots of hunters," said Sheriff Minto today in speaking of the trip. "The country is literally lousy with them and the only safe way to hunt is to wear a bright red shirt and a big white hat. The shirt and the hat operate two ways. It keeps the hunters from mistaking a man for a deer and shooting him, and it also hypnotizes the deer so that they will stand still and be shot." "Why," he said by way of emphasizing the necessity of the red shirt and the white hat, "one day I met a mountaineer on the trail. He had with him a little black dog and on the dog's tail there was tied a large bright red ribbon. I inquired as to the reason for the ribbon on the dog's tail, and he advised me that hunters had so often mistaken the dog for a bear and shot at him that he concluded that the only way to protect him was to put a red ribbon on his tail."

**Law is Bad.** "The law is hard to live up to," continued the sheriff. "It provides that a hunter must not be found in possession of a dog but only bucks. It is often hard to distinguish between the two when you run up a
