ARE COMING TO MEET ONLY DISAPPOINTMENT

UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE
 San Francisco, Aug. 30.—International presidents of five great crafts are scheduled to arrive here this afternoon from the East to confer with General Manager Julius Kruttschnitt of the Harriman lines as to demands by its shophmen, which threaten a railroad war.

The union representatives en route are J. W. Kline, of the blacksmiths; Joseph Franklin, of the boiler-makers; M. F. Ryan, of the carmen; M. O'Sullivan, of the Metal workers, and James O'Connell, of the machinists.

That they are doomed to disappointment is a foregone conclusion, unless they consent to abandon their position as representatives of a federation, and enter the conference with Kruttschnitt, as individual heads of respective crafts. The official statement is that the railroad system is disposed to grant some of the demands, should they be made by the separate crafts, but not to consider them should they come through the federated trades committee.

Although hard to reconcile with the statement that the railroad may grant the shophmen's demands, it made by each craft separately, South Pacific officials here today declare lack of business is causing general retrenchment, and that no worry is felt regarding the threatened strike.

"This is the worst time of the year that the men could have chosen to present their demands," one official said. "The heavy freight traffic attendant on the California fruit season is over, business in general is slack, and a large number of cars are idle all over the system."

The international presidents of the crafts will be met on arrival by Ernest L. Roguin, head of the federated shophment west of the Mississippi, and other labor officials. The present situation will be explained fully before the conference with Kruttschnitt is sought, but it is believed that reports of the aggressive stand taken by the railroad will not be allowed to interfere with the union representatives' attempt to adjust matters amicably.

MERCHANTS SHOULD KEEP LIGHTS GOING

With a view of avoiding burglaries in the city during the fair, the police today made a request upon all merchants and business men in the city to keep lights burning in their buildings during the fair week.

The burglaries last night of the Crown drug store, say the police, shows the necessity of keeping lights in the buildings. Had this building been properly illuminated, located as it is on State street, the burglary could probably be avoided. Crooks from all over the West will wind their way to the city during the fair week, and while the force will be increased then, in order to handle the situation the police will need the cooperation of the people then as now.

The police believe that by keeping lights in the buildings during the week that they will be able to keep the situation in hand.

Pittsburg scored one in each the second and third, and made three runs in the seventh to clinch the game. Another was scored in the ninth.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 30.—In a statement to Union Pacific shophmen here today, General Manager Fuller, who has charge of the Omaha shops of that road, urged that the demands of the shophmen on the Harriman roads should be withdrawn, as they were unfair.

Fuller explained from the point of view of the roads why the men's demands were not reasonable, and put the case up to the workers.
