about his neck, and sobbing out her words of joy and gratitude. When her emotions subsided many of the spectators approached Webb and shook hands with him, and congratulated him.

Governor Exacted Pledge.
The governor advised the condemned man and the wife and daughter of his decision just a little before noon. He made it dependent upon a promise from them that in the future they would make no appeals for clemency for the condemned man, and to this condition they agreed. The condition and its acceptance by the wife and daughter were reduced to writing, and will be placed among the files of the case.

Girl's Pleadings Too Much.
"While I am opposed to capital punishment, I would nevertheless have let Webb hang had it not been for the pleadings of his wife and little girl," said Governor West, after commuting the sentence.

"The many letters and petitions I received did not influence me in the least," he continued, "but I could not get away from the pleadings of his little girl. Every time I would look at my own little girl I would wonder what she would think of me if I should permit the other little girl's father to be choked to death, simply to satisfy a few people who happened to be a little bloodthirsty. In addition to this the sight of the wife and daughter—and the thought of the hanging—would bring to my mind those two little poems from 'Songs of the Soil,' by Frank L. Stanton, 'The Tragedy' and 'They've Hung Bill Jones.'"

Quotes Poems.
After making this statement with regard to the case, he quoted the two poems referred to, and which are as follows:

They've Hung Bill Jones.
"They've hung Bill Jones to the sycamore tree,
And his wife an' his mother is a-weepin';
An' his children come from the house to see,
An' the col' wind a-wallin' an' a-creepin'."

"Oh, the col' wind's a-wallin' an' a-creepin',
An' the wife an' the mother is a-weepin';
An' the children's there
Fer to stan' an' stare,
An' the col' wind a-wallin' an' a-creepin'."

They've Hung Bill Jones for a crime of his.
An' his wife an' his mother a-dy-in';
An' his children's took where the orphans is—
An' the col' wind a-creepin' an' a-sighin'."

The Tragedy.
"That's him there, on the scaffold,
See! he speaks:
There's a child there, a holdin' of the hands that'll soon be foldin',
An' the tears is jest a-rainin' down her cheeks."

"That's him there, in his coffin, in the cart,
An' that's his wife a-creepin' in the crowd—'way off an' weepin';
Oh, the law is jest a-breakin' of her heart.
"That's him there in the coffin lyin' low,
An' the woman—first to love him
An' the last to bend above him,
Is his mother—but I reckon you would know."

Story of the Crime.
Portland, Or., Sept. 5.—Jesse P. Webb, whose sentence was commuted today, murdered Wm. A. Johnson, a wealthy ranchman, at the New Grand Central hotel here, October 21, 1910. After beating Johnson nearly to death with a blackjack, Webb stuffed the body, still alive, in a trunk, which had previously been purchased for the purpose, and sent it to the union depot in an express wagon. There he checked the trunk to South Puget, Wash.

Before the trunk was forwarded, bloodstains led to the discovery of its contents, and two days later Mrs. Carrie Kersh, who had accompanied Johnson from Spokane, and Webb were arrested together. Mrs. Kersh had \$1900, which Johnson had given her for safe keeping. The money furnished a motive for the crime. Both Webb and the woman had deserted their families in Seattle previously, and had been living together in Spokane, where Mrs. Kersh met Johnson. They were charged with the murder.

SAYS NEW STAR IS THE RESULT OF A COLLISION

Cambridge, Mass., Sept. 5.—Famous as Harvard observatory has been for its successful photographs of the new star, "Nova," as it is called by astronomers, there is special significance attached here to the theory just enunciated by Professor Bickerton, of New Zealand, that, contrary to long-accepted ideas, these new stars are part of the manifestation of a collision between stars in which there is a third body formed by the tearing off and fusing together of parts of the suns.

Regarding this, Professor Pickering says, "Up to the present time it has been the generally accepted theory that the new star was the result of a collision of two suns, or came as the result of heat generated when a sun plunges into a stream of meteors. Speaking of the passing away into dust of these new stars, an interesting case was that of Nova Aurigae, which appeared in 1901.

"For three or four days after its appearance it was very brilliant, in fact as any star in the northern sky. It then rapidly began to grow faint, and a few weeks later photographs taken of it at the Yerkes observatory show a nebulous ring about it that seemed to be moving away rapidly.

"It was receding at the velocity of light, or at the rate of 185,000 miles a second, and it was thought that this formed after the collision of the two suns, which are so close together that they are seen as one."

SECRETARY IS BIDDING FOR ANOTHER JOB

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 5.—Strong laudation of President Taft, with a prediction that his re-election is almost certain was voiced here today by Secretary James Wilson, of the agricultural department. Speaking at the fair, Wilson said:
"President Taft is no politician. He understands and applies the great principles of government. I have not the slightest doubt of his re-nomination. It is up to the people of the West and Middle West to elect him.

Says Rolph Will Be Mayor.
[REPEATED FROM LEADER.]
Portland, Or., Sept. 5.—Judge Lawler, of San Francisco, before whom most of the San Francisco graft cases were tried, today predicted that James Rolph, Jr., would be elected mayor of San Francisco, at the primaries September 26.

Lawler asserted that McCarthy will not receive the full labor vote, as is claimed and that he will lose heavily on all sides, because he failed, Lawler said, "to be a friend to the tenderloin and the moral element at the same time."
