A Pathetic Sight—
One of the pathetic sights on the streets during fair week is that of a blind woman who is using a small hand organ as a means of earning a living. She is totally blind, and, early this morning, despite the chilly weather, was at her stand on State street, long before the crowds started for the cars. She is accompanied by her daughter, a miss of seven or eight years of age. The little girl leads her mother to the chair on the walk, prepares the hand organ for business, sets in place the tin cup used for collecting stray nickels and dimes, and then amuses herself on the walk while the mother plays the hand organ. It is pitiful indeed. Pitiful for the poor blind old woman and doubly pitiful for the baby deprived of the rights of childhood and cheerfully doing the duty that falls to her.
