PASSED OUT STEPHENSON'S WAD FREELY

SPENT NEARLY \$10,000 POSTING LETTERS BUT CANNOT REMEMBER WHAT THE LETTERS WERE ABOUT—HAS HANDY "FORGETTERY."

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 7.—Thousands of dollars spent on postage and advertising was the subject taken up today in the Stephenson election investigation, when the witness stand was resumed by Robert

Sackett, of the publicity bureau for the Stephenson campaign.

Sackett testified that \$49,827 had been spent for postage during the campaign, \$1200 being spent in one day. On this day 6000 letters were sent out, and 42 girls were kept busy all day mailing them. When asked for a copy of one of the letters Sackett was unable to produce a single specimen. He stated that the copybooks were probably all destroyed after the campaign.

When asked about the subject matter of the letters, Sackett replied: "It is pretty hard for me to say now."

The witness continued that he had paid Ellis B. Usher \$600, as publicity agent, but he could not tell what Usher did with the coin.

Sackett was also in total ignorance as to who prepared the advertisements for Stephenson. He paid for various articles written, but was unable to furnish samples of them.

COUNTY WILL PUT IN EIGHT CLUSTER LIGHTS

Eight cluster lights, instead of 16, as recommended by the business men, was the decision reached by the board of county commissioners today concerning providing cluster lights for the county's property, to fit in a general scheme of cluster lighting for the city.

Four of the posts will be put near the corners, so that the square will be provided with three lights on all sides. The business men, when they waited on the board, recommended that 16 lights be installed, but the board concluded that the expense would be too heavy, and that eight lights would be sufficient.

BORDWELL TO PRESIDE AT TRIALS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Los Angeles, Oct. 7.—Following a conference with attorneys, Clarence Darrow and LeCompte Davis, of the McNamara defense, Superior Judge Walter Bordwell at 10:45 o'clock this morning informally denied the request of the defense for a change of judge.

This means that Judge Bordwell undoubtedly will sit in the case. Attorneys Darrow and Davis immediately announced that they would file affidavits with a view of asking for a change of judge on the ground of bias.

Judge Bordwell will formally rule on the request, probably Wednesday.

STRIKERS AND BREAKERS HAVE LIVELY SCRAP

San Francisco, Oct. 7.—Shortly before noon four guards came out of the yards and hurled insults at the pickets. The pickets walked over toward the guards and rocks were soon flying. The men closed in and a general fight was on, when the state railroad police rushed up and restored peace. Two of the pickets were arrested. Three of the guards were badly bruised in the melee. All of the guards are now armed with riot clubs.

ANNOUNCES HIS CABINET NEXT MONDAY

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 7.—The cabinet of Robert L. Borden, new premier of Canada, will not be announced until Monday, according to advices received here. It is understood that the various provinces will be represented as follows:

Nova Scotia, Robert L. Borden; New Brunswick, Premier Hazen; Quebec, C. J. Doherty, G. H. Perley, F. D. Monk, L. P. Pelletier; Ontario, Frank Cochrane, G. E. Foster, W. T. White, W. S. Middleboro; Manitoba, Dr. Roche; Saskatchewan, Robert Rodgers; Alberta, Senator Longhead; British Columbia, Martin Birrell.

It is probable that Foster will supervise the department of state and of internal affairs, while White will be finance minister and Doherty will be minister of justice.

BANDIT IS RUN DOWN AND SHOT

Bartlesville, Okla., Oct. 7.—Frank Amos, the alleged bandit who looted the Missouri, Kansas and Texas train near Okesa recently, was cornered in the hay loft of a barn near Elgin, Kansas, and shot to death. Another alleged bandit, Amos Hayes, is hiding in the Osage hills, while a sheriff's posse is hot upon his trail.

Quiet on Illinois Central.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, Oct. 7.—Reports from towns along the line of the Illinois Central today are that rioting there is apparently ceasing. It is admitted that many of the shops are not working, the imported strikebreakers being unable to perform the duties of the strikers.
