CALIFORNIA ELECTION IS ON TODAY

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Despite reports of light polling all over California today on various amendments to the state constitution, political forecasters here this afternoon declare that most of the proposals will be sanctioned by the people. The initiative, referendum and recall amendment, it is said, is sure to carry by a heavy vote. Woman suffrage too, it is predicted will be adopted by a narrow majority.

The most important of the other amendments offered to the people for approval are those strengthening the powers of the state railroad commission and allowing for compulsory workmen's compensation. The passage of both is predicted, the vote in the last case being expected to be double for the positive side that cast by those who oppose the amendment.

Political prophets here admit that suffrage will be beaten in San Francisco and the bay cities by not more than 4,000 or 5,000. At the last election it was beaten by a large majority. The difference, it is believed, with the probably affirmative state vote, will be sufficient to secure the ballot to women.

Twenty Transports Sail

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] London, Oct. 10.—An official dispatch from Naples declares that 20 Italian transports sailed today for Syracuse, where they will join the second division of the Tripoli expedition.

It is reported that Turkey torpedo boats, off the coast of Sicily, are prepared for battle.

The belief prevails in London that the landing of more Italian troops in Tripoli means the end of the war as far as Turkey is concerned, and that peace will be declared shortly.

TO APPEAL IN THE CASE OF BEATTIE

Richmond, Va., Oct. 10.—The fight for the life of Henry Clay Beattie Jr., the wealthy young man convicted of the murder of his wife, will be carried on through a writ of error, petition which his attorneys are preparing, according to statements made here today. The petition will be presented in court November 8.

An alleged statement made by the condemned man to a friend is published here today as follows: "I will show them how a man should die, if that is what they are waiting for. Electric chair? Bah. What's that—nothing. If the switchboard is near enough, I'll turn the current on myself. When a man has got to die let him die manfully and without whimpering. But there is the supreme court. It still must act on my case before everything is over. I suppose some people are glad I am in this fix."
