and personally led the parade through yelling and mobs, who offered rewards of \$50 to any man who would knock her down or capture her bonnet. Her courage and boldness on the street were only equalled by her tact and wisdem behind the scenes.

She finally took the matter to Parliament, to interview the mambers of the commons and representatives of the lords, and at last won the repeal of the obnoxious bylaws which forbade the army's privileges

Her- last appointment in England, under the title of Field Conjulationer, was in command of the I ondon Province and as principal of the International Training Home, in which position she had 21,000 Salvation soldiers, 600 officers and about 300 cadets always under her control.

From here she received orders for Canada, where as commissioner for nine years, she wrought magnificent service in the work to which her vast abilities are consecrated.
