of little hands waved the national flag. Mrs. Grace Wheelock was lifted up into the president's motor car and she got up on the seat beside the driver, Tom Livesley, and a thousand voices burst out singing America? And there was no stopping them. They sang all four verses with a bang, and when Mrs. Wheelock stepped down, the president soon had them in the best of humor, answering questions about Oregon, the flag and the Panama canal. He gave them several samples of his hearty laugh, and said he hoped they would remember him for something besides the fact that he had given them a holiday.

President Well Guarded.
The parade was well handled under the direction of Master of Ceremonies Geo. F. Rodgers. At the head rode Chief of Police Hamilton with a platoon of police that cleared the street before them. On each side of the president's car rode two of the regular army officers. The eight automobiles carried the rest of the party, and all went like clockwork. The procession was greeted with few cries of "Hello Bill" and almost no applause along the drive. One man yelled "Hurrah for Bryant" and got some horse laughs from the crowd. The president makes a very pleasing appearance and everybody felt proud of him. He says he made all of his set speeches but one—he must talk on the canal at San Francisco. He said at the breakfast table that he would, aside from that one formal speech, make off-hand talks on what was nearest his heart. He is jolly, open-hearted and affable as a man, and a fine looking man, who eats lightly, takes no liquors of any kind, and leaves the impression that the crowd that there is a strong conservative under tow in his favor. Parties who have been at many of his meetings, say sentiment is growing in his favor.

Crowds at Court House.
There was a good 5,000 people assembled at the court house square—possibly more. The program committee got in its deadly work and everything went according to program. Governor West, welcomed the president to the state, Mayor Lachmund welcomed him on behalf of the city, and Congressman Hawley introduced him to the people. He exceeded his time limit as usual and spoke longer than both his predecessors and there was general relief when he quit enlarging on the greatness of Taft, and the greatness of our country, both of which are factors that the crowd seemed to be familiar with, and a great cheer rolled up from the crowd when he quit and introduced the president. The president soon had the immense audience in good humor. His voice carried magnificently and he could be heard to the uttermost edge of the crowd. Perfect order prevailed and the president was in his best vein. The sun was beginning to break through the fog and the day was perfect.

Enlivened the Capital City.
The president paid a glowing eulogy to the beautiful Capital City of Oregon, and its hospitable people. He was glad to be in Oregon. At each of his four addresses in Salem he boosted for the presence of the grand old battleship Oregon at the opening of the Panama canal. He said the ship would be there if he had any influence with the administration. (Laughter.) He would never forget his visit to the Capital City. At the breakfast he turned to Congressman Hawley and asked him what part of the district he resided in. "Why, I reside in Salem," said the congressman. "Oh, you are the congressman from the Capital City," said the president, and added, "you ought to be proud. How long have you lived here?" as he asked the president. "All my life," said the congressman. The president then delivered a very enjoyable speech on the Panama canal, on the international peace treaty and the audience cheered his broad and statesmanlike utterances on these subjects. He said the engineers hoped to have the canal completed by January 1, 1913, but not later than July.

Gets College Honors.
Willamette University has a live bunch of students at present, and they captured the president for membership in the Philodorian Society. They sent him a letter saying: "We, the members of the Philodorian Society of Willamette University, have this evening taken action extending to you an earnest invitation to become an honorary member of this, the oldest literary society in the Pacific Northwest."
The acknowledgment of the president addressed to J. O. Stearns, Jr., and Merton R. DeLong, committee, was as follows: "It gives me pleasure to accept your invitation to become an honorary member of the Philodorian Society of Willamette University. The Philodorians have the only autograph letter given by the president while he was in the city. The president's train pulled out of Trade street at 11 o'clock sharp, with the president bowing his farewells from the observation car, the entire length of Trade street, which was crowded with people. The president's reception at Salem was a great success and reflects credit on the people.

Railroad Officials Along.
At Portland a party of prominent Southern Pacific officials joined the Taft party and went with them to the state line. Those in the private car San Jose, were as follows: J. D. Stack, assistant general manager Southern Pacific, Portland; Wm. McMurray, general passenger agent Southern Pacific company, Portland; H. R. Judah, assistant general passenger agent Southern Pacific company, San Francisco; Joseph Wood Hill, M. D., Portland; K. S. Myrtle, San Francisco Examiner. These officials had a place in the parade in the private car of J. L. Stockton, and were shown the city by R. B. Houston, the local representative of the Harriman line.

IT'S LABOR, THEY HOPE.

fact that in putting James B. McNamara on trial first the state had scored a strategic victory. It was conceded that much of the evidence noted labor leader was the heat and against John J. McNamara is indicative rather than positive, and that to establish this state's claim that the noted labor leader was the head and front of a murder conspiracy, it will be absolutely necessary to show that such a conspiracy actually did exist. The defense, of course, contends that James B. McNamara is innocent of the murder of Hagerly or any of the 21 men who lost their lives in the early morning October 1, a year ago, when fire destroyed the antiquated structure which housed the Los Angeles Times. But, for the sake of argument, the attorneys say, that the state secured a conviction of James B. McNamara so this would be only the beginning of the foundation of Detective Burns' hope of involving John McNamara and other labor leaders in a coast to coast dynamiting performance.

The defense in J. B. McNamara's case will be an arduous and wearisome one. His identity is closely guarded but he will be called to establish that he was not in or near the Times building at or near the time of the explosion. But in the case of J. J. McNamara an alibi is admitted by the state, and conspiracy is charged. J. B. McNamara was a factor in this conspiracy, and so was Orville McManigal, if the state's case is to stand. And the acts of one of the conspirators were the acts of every member of the group, no matter how widely separated, the state contends, and therefore, if J. B. McNamara is convicted of Hagerly's death, his elder brother he must be equally guilty, whether he is in Denver, Indianapolis or New York on the night of the explosion.

It is because of this fact that the trial of J. B. McNamara will be drawn out for weeks. More than 250 witnesses will be called, many of whom will testify, should Judge Bordwell not interfere, to matters having absolutely no connection with the destruction of the Times building. They will be individuals rounded up by Detective Burns to support his allegation that John J. McNamara was an active participant in a murder syndicate.
