SUFFRAGE MAJORITY IS GROWING

IT IS NOW ESTIMATED THAT IT WILL REACH 2000, BUT THE FIGURES CANNOT BE OBTAIN—IT IS CERTAIN THOUGH THAT IT CARRIES.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—Corrections and revisions returns from far outlying districts of the state today again altered the figures of the suffrage vote which now is variously estimated as the majority of the "fars" over the "ag'ants" by from 2300 to 2500. There is no doubt that suffrage has won but all attempts at exact figures are mere guess work.

From a half score of places here today where tabulations are being kept of the returns came varying estimates. Many of the precincts in the mountains districts have not reported, many of them have been reported twice, and erroneously, so that it is really impossible for the public suffragettes to know just where they stand. That California women will vote, however, is not denied and there is strong probability that, when the last vote is correctly counted, "the cause" will be shown with a majority of at least 3000.

TWO THOUSAND MEN WORKING ON ELECTRIC

RIGHT OF WAY MATTERS NOT YET SETTLED AND IT NOW SEEMS POSSIBLE THEY WILL ALL REACH THE COURTS.

The construction work on the Oregon Electric is rushed day and night. In all about two thousand men and teams are employed between Salem and the Santiam river. The first few miles out of Salem are being built with steam shovel and trestle-work tracks, and dump cars with small locomotives. The rest is going in with teams and scrapers. There are several pile drivers at work south of the city. The work on Mill street has stopped at South Commercial street, as no right of way settlement has been made with the Spaulding Logging Company. Mr. Spaulding agreed with Mr. McDowell to settle at \$12,500 but the agreement was not ratified at Portland by the highways and Mr. Spaulding's lawyers have filed an answer in the suit for condemnation. An effort was made to begin work on the Harry Minto property but the contractors were not allowed to enter on the premises. It is understood that no progress was made at the conferences held in Portland, and all the cases will probably be tried out beginning October 30th.
