Moore, of Portland, has advised Secretary Olcott that he is willing to make changes in the oil painting of the late Governor Benson, along the lines suggested by the dead governor's wife, and it will be sent back to his studio. By reason of the fact that the legislature made no appropriation for the payment of the painter, he must wait until the next legislature convenes.

For the Charter-- Arrangements have been made to boost the Commission charter by holding a mass meeting at the Leslie M. E. church next Tuesday evening, in South Salem. Geo. F. Rodgers will be the principal speaker.

Register-- You will have to register at the city hall if you take part in the commission charter election, which promises to be the biggest municipal battle ever pitted on the boards at the Capital City.

Has a New Hat-- Alderman Walt Low, feeling that the commission form of government is going to wipe him out as one of the city fathers, has invested in a new hat, and looks quite spruce and kidish.

Visits Other Churches-- Rev. John Ovall, pastor of our Swedish church, left for Portland today. From there he will go to the Swedish Colony Venersborg, in Clark county, Wash., to hold services, and superintendent church buildings. He states that the future for the Swedish church in Salem is bright.

Turns in Tax Money-- Sheriff Minto this afternoon turned over delinquent taxes to the county treasurer amounting to \$33,254.60. They represent collections made since September 6 and up to October 2. According to Sheriff Minto the taxes for the county will be more fully collected this year than any year in its history.

Klaus Had Best of It-- Philadelphia, Oct. 19.--The leading fight critics here today give Frank Klaus, the Pittsburgh middleweight, credit for outpointing Leo Houck, in their six-round bout last night. While Klaus had a shade the better of the milling, Houck at the finish looked good for 12 rounds more.

Player's Sister Dead-- Philadelphia, Oct. 19.--One player will carry onto the diamond a weight of sorrow to the fourth game of the world's series tomorrow as a result of a message received here today by Reuben M. Oldring, centerfielder of the Athletics, that his sister, Lillian Oldring, is dead at her home in Mount Vernon, N. Y. Despite his grief, Oldring will take his place in the game tomorrow.

SHIPYARDS HAVE ORDERS FOR 98 SHIPS

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.] New York, Oct. 19.--Revival of the American merchant marine is indicated by present activity of American ship yards, whose orders are held for the building of a fleet aggregating 98 ships.

The prospects of new business, following the opening of the Panama canal, is responsible for the expansion. Among the big contracts are four steamers for the American Hawaiian line, two for the Standard Oil company, three steam whalers for the Pacific Coast Steamship company, two passenger steamers for the Clyde line, two for the Atlantic & Pacific line, four for the Panama-American Mail Steamship line, and two for the Alaska Steamship company.

The American merchant marine now has a tonnage of 7,598,082, which is almost a million tons greater than the fleets of Germany, France and Norway combined.

Bids for carrying the mails between Atlantic and Pacific ports for the United States, will be opened November 20.
