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TEACHERS' INSTITUTE ADJOURNS

After a program consisting of addresses by prominent educators and a general discussion of questions of importance to the schools in general the teachers assembled in an institute here for three days, adjourned yesterday afternoon. Prior to adjournment resolutions praising State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman and County School Superintendent Smith, and endorsing the recent legislation on education were passed.

The resolutions were as follows: "Be it resolved by the teachers of Marion county:

"First—That we pledge our most hearty support to our worthy and hardworking county superintendent, Mr. W. M. Smith, in all measures that he may inaugurate for the advancement and good of the schools of Marion county.

"Second—That we shall evince our appreciation of the splendid talks and helpful suggestions given us by the men and women who have stood before us in both the general and department sessions, by putting them into practical use so far as we are able.

"Third—That we place ourselves on record in hearty commendation of the new course of study issued by the state office.

"Fourth—We heartily endorse the action of State Superintendent Alderman in securing the enactment of the new law of certification; also his further efforts in securing the law creating the office of county supervisor, wherein the standard of our schools will be raised and the efficiency of the teachers greatly increased.

"Fifth—In view of the fact that the teachers are the ones who are compelled to use the books chosen by the State Textbook commission, and are best able to judge the need of the pupils and the fitness of certain books to fulfill that need, we believe that a majority of the Textbook commission should be teachers.

"Sixth—Since it is a recognized fact that progress and efficiency along industrial and professional lines is commensurate with the skill and specialized training employed, and since only hope of raising the standard of the teacher's profession is through more adequate preparation and special training on the part of the great majority of the teachers now entering upon the work of school teaching, be it resolved, that we endorse most heartily the more ample provision as provided by recent legislation for normal training of teachers, and that we respectfully urge further legislation providing that after the year 1914, no teacher be permitted to teach in the state of Oregon who has not had at least nine months of normal training, or equivalent successful experience, to be determined by the proper authorities.

"Seventh—That we favor an established minimum salary of \$50, and above this a graduated scale, based upon successful experience, to be determined by the county superintendent, the school supervisors or the principal's association.

"Further, That copies of these resolutions be sent to and published in all the papers of the county.

WATCHMAN WAS KILLED BY ACCIDENT

The killing of Nightwatchman Houghton, of Albany, last night by a freight train of the Southern Pacific at the depot of that city, was an accident, was the declaration of Railroad Commissioner Miller, who made an inspection of it, and who returned from there this morning.

The Shasta Limited was standing on the track in front of the depot and the night watchman was watching it. On a side track just beyond a large freight train was switching and it was backing up in the direction where Houghton was standing. Not observing it, he stepped over on the track just as it neared him and was struck by the engine, one leg being cut off and the other crushed. He died this morning from the injuries sustained.

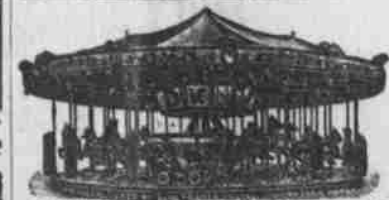
