AN ORDINANCE

Appropriating Money for the support and Maintenance of a Salem Band, and Providing the Manner of Expending the Same.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon:

Section 1. That the sum of \$2500.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the same in hereby appropriated out of the money in the general fund in the city treasury not otherwise appropriated for the support and maintenance of a Salem band.

Section 2. That the expenditure of the money hereby appropriated be and the same is hereby entrusted in the hands of a special committee to be appointed by the Common Council for that purpose, said committee to have the power and it shall be their duty to enter into a contract with some suitable person or persons to maintain a band. Said committee shall have the power to provide in said contract the employment for a number of public concerts to be given by said band, and to make all other provisions and arrangements necessary to be made for the support and maintenance of a public band.

Ballot Title. "Shall a Salem band be supported and maintained by the City of Salem by municipal appropriation?" Vote yes or no.
