

PROFESSOR ALDERMAN AGAIN HOME

ATTENDED NATIONAL COUNTRY LIFE CONGRESS AND ILLUSTRATED THE WORK OF OREGON'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Professor Alderman, state superintendent of public instruction, has just returned from Spokane, where he has been making an exhibit of the development of Oregon's schools at the National Country Life Congress, which recently convened at that place.

Thousands of people were in daily attendance, every state in the Union being represented. The interest the farmers took in the meetings was especially noticeable, many coming from other states in order to be present. In speaking of the assembly, Mr. Alderman said:

"The congress was a success in every way. Thousands of people took active interest and the huge armory was always crowded. The people seemed to be especially interested in Oregon, and every bit of literature we had on her resources and development was eagerly taken. Our exhibit attracted much attention, and some were surprised to learn that Oregon was in the front in school matters. The system of rural high schools as adopted in Linn and Lane counties, met with much commendation, and I believe it will be the working out of this plan that will ultimately bring the schools and home closer together."

"The country life problem is, to my mind, one of the greatest questions which faces the people of the state and nation. We must get back to the soil and stay there. In order to do this the country home must become the ideal home. At the late congress a model country home was shown, which will save a mile of walking daily to the housewife. Every country home should be as good as the best country home, and every country school should be as efficient as her sister school in the city. The country boy must be reached through activities, and the country school must become the social center for debating, literary work and entertainment."

"All of these subjects were gone over by such speakers of national reputation as P. G. Holden, of Iowa; H. B. Cokeran of Maryland; E. E. Faville, of Nebraska, and J. E. Wing, of Ohio. The governors of Washington and Idaho also appeared, and I was called on to represent Governor West, since it was impossible for him to be present."

"I believe that this congress has done permanent good for the country life movement, and that as a result more interest will be taken in the farm and in the country schools."

BATTLE IS IMMINENT AT NANKING

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Shanghai, Dec. 1.—The rebel army is again closing in on Nanking, and another big battle is imminent, according to advices received here today.

Details of the Imperialists' retreat within the walls state that they fell back in disorganization and they are reported to be running short of both ammunition and food supplies. From the semi-circular of forts stretching for 15 miles about the city the revolutionists continue a desultory fire from light guns. One of the big hall guns thundered just before dawn today and it was expected as a signal for renewed attack, but heavy firing ceased again almost immediately, and the rebel commanders began organizing their force below in battle front about the city.

Rebel sympathizers within the walls last night attempted to aid the revolutionary forces by firing the city in half a dozen places. The fires are interpreted as signals to indicate the least protected sections of the city.

Captured Magazine. MEXICANS CLAIM TWO VICTORIES

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Mexico City, Dec. 1.—Reports of two federal victories in the routing of Candido Procel's band in Guanajuato, near the state capital last Tuesday and the killing of Jesus Del Palacio near Canitas, Durango, yesterday afternoon were reported to the war department here today. Procel's uprising was in the name of Reyes, and that of Palacio in the name of Ejmilio Vasquez Gomez. There were no great losses in either fight. Procel was reported wounded.

Moore's attorney will present their culmination later today. It is expected, and the case that has created a furor in society circles will draw to a close. It is predicted that Mrs. Moore will secure her divorce.

Witnesses called in rebuttal today unanimously denied Moore's accusations against his wife on the "excessive indulgence" charges, declaring they had never seen her intoxicated, and but rarely ever take a drink, the occasions on which she did being in the company of her husband.

Mrs. Moore was again called to the stand. She merely denied allegations made by her husband during his testimony.

THE STOKES CASE BEGINS TO STIR THINGS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Dec. 1.—No delay in the trial of the show girls, Lillian Graham and Ethel Conrad, occurred today on account of the illness of W. E. D. Stokes, the millionaire whom they are accused of shooting. Stokes is suffering with a severe attack of indigestion.

Marian Brophy, stenographer for Stokes, examined the clothes which the millionaire wore on the night of the shooting in the courtroom today and testified that it would be impossible for him to have disguised himself in them. The stenographer was unable to identify several letters which the defense claims Stokes wrote to the show girls.

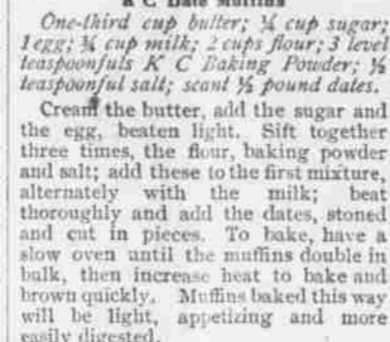
Stokes was seized suddenly with an attack of indigestion while attending the "old glory" horse sale in Madison Square Garden. He is in bed under the care of trained nurse. Albert Gleason, Stokes' personal attorney, stated that the millionaire was "good and sick" but not seriously ill. Agnes Haade, floor clerk of the Hotel Ansonia, testified that she warned Lillian Graham away from the hotel on one occasion, after the marriage of Stokes.

"I asked her: 'What are you doing here? Don't you know that Stokes is married? You may cause trouble between him and his wife if she sees you,'" declared the witness.

RUSSIA AND ENGLAND WOULD DIVIDE TURKEY

St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—Russia today ordered an advance of troops to the Persian frontier indicating that it intends to force upon Persia an immediate acceptance of its ultimatum involving the expulsion of W. Morgan Shuster, American financial treasurer of the Shah's monarchy. Unless Persia acquiesces in the Russian demand for the expulsion of Shuster, there is a big chance of England and Russia gobbling her. The decision to move the troops on Teheran followed the Persian parliament's rejection of England's suggestion that she accede to the Russian ultimatum. Undoubtedly England and Russia have reached a definite understanding that Persia shall be partitioned unless Shuster is ousted from his position. It is unknown what Shuster will do.
