SALEM HEIGHTS LEAGUE WILL HAVE "DOINGS"

WILL HAVE BIG CELEBRATION SATURDAY EVENING IN HONOR OF THE COMPLETION OF SCHOOL HOUSE, HALL AND OTHER BUILDINGS.

With a new hall just completed, a school house, two stores and a photograph gallery established, members of the Salem Heights Improvement League last evening assembled at the school house and made preparations for celebrating the growth of that section of the city by holding a grand opening Saturday night.

The affair will be held in the new hall. The women members will participate by holding a handkerchief bazaar, and serving lunch. The program arranged will consist of music, song and speeches. Interest among the members last night ran high and the affair promises to be one of the best attended of its kind ever held in the county.

Many Improvements Made.
Not long ago all that Salem Heights could boast was a photograph gallery. The gallery is still there but many improvements have been made to it. E. G. Lantz is the proprietor, and he is also the proprietor of the People's Mercantile Store. He carries in stock a complete line of groceries, notions, mill feed and grain. The other store referred to is Healy's grocery store, and he also carries a good stock of goods.

The schoolhouse was completed and equipped some time ago and is now doing service. It is a substantial structure and well equipped. The new hall has just been finished and is modern in interior arrangement and equipment. The lot upon which it stands was donated to the league by F. A. Thompson and formally turned over to the league last night.

Recently Incorporated.
The league recently filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. After making a few changes the old constitution and by-laws were adopted. It can boast of a good membership, and all of them are working hand in hand and shoulder to shoulder for Salem heights.

RUSHING WORK ON THE SEWER CONTRACTS
The gigantic municipal excavator owned by the Jan Construction company, is working night and day in order to finish the big Center street sewer on contract time, or by February 15th. The big ditch started on Center street near the river with a depth of 23 feet, and five feet wide. The company has now run the ditch to the intersection of Church and Court streets, where the sewer connects with that on Court street, where the cut is but three feet in width and 10 feet deep.

In the course of construction many difficulties have arisen, not the least of which has been the unstable nature of the ground. This has caused many cave-ins along the line and has set the work back considerably. Many people are taking advantage of the opportunity to see modern machinery in operation and it is wonderful to see with what apparent ease the big machines lift the dirt, lay the heavy pipes and then fill in the ditches.

Superintendent of construction, G. T. Morgan says that during the excellent weather the excavator will

work every day, Sunday included, as well as part of the night in order to catch up with the schedule. The connection with the Court street sewer will be made some time today, when the machine will be moved to Chemeketa and Church streets where the sewer is to be run up Chemeketa to Thirteenth street and then south on Thirteenth one block. When this completed, a change will be made to Union and Church where the sewer will be run up Union to Capital street.

THE BUSINESS MEN'S LEAGUE GETTING BUSY

DR. OLINGER RESIGNS PRESIDENCY AND ROLAND K. PAGE IS ELECTED TO PLACE—MANY IMPORTANT MATTERS DISCUSSED AT LAST NIGHT'S SESSION.

The Business Men's League held its regular meeting last night, and, besides transacting the regular routine business, elected Roland K. Page as president. Dr. Olinger having resigned, and also discussed matters of interest to the league. Mr. Page was a member of the board of directors, and E. T. Barnes was selected to fill his place.

Considerable discussion was indulged in as to the advisability of amending the constitution of the league so as to give it jurisdiction over the advertising of the members, the league now having jurisdiction over solicitors. It was finally decided to have an amendment prepared, and when it is submitted the subject will be thoroughly threshed out. Much opposition was found last night to it.

With the view of creating more interest in the affairs of the league, and bringing out a better attendance a committee was appointed to prepare a banquet for the first meeting in January, and also to arrange for the holding of a kangaroo court. Counselman Lafky appeared before the league, and talked at length relative to means to be adopted to sweep the hard surfaced streets. He represented that it would cost considerable money, and desired an expression of the business men on the subject before the item was put in the annual budget. No definite expression was given.

To Secure Better Rate.
A letter was received from Edward M. Cousins, the rate expert employed by the league to obtain better rates. It is as follows, and is self-explanatory:

Portland, Dec. 2.
"Business Men's League, Salem, Ore.:
"Gentlemen: On the 30th of this month I shall deliver the first installment of the 'goods' in the freight rate controversy. Upon that date, as you will find by asking your railroad agent to show you Supplement 22 to Westbound Tariff 4-H, top of page 69, the class rate from all eastern points to all Willamette valley points will be the same as to Portland.

"That much of our case is therefore satisfactorily disposed of, for the present at least. The special commodity rates are still in process of adjustment, but a favorable conclusion of the entire case is expected shortly.

"It has been a somewhat tedious proceeding with many obstacles to overcome, but we have at last secured substantial recognition of our contention.

"I hope before long to report further progress with the other rates, but feel that even this much is quite gratifying. Very truly yours,

WILLAMETTE IS TO HAVE A FINE FIELD

Ancient Willamette field will soon be a thing of the past, in fact as well as in name, for the big athletic stadium is to be partially filled in and the field is to be rechristened. This change is due to the efforts of Coach Sweetland who has an insatiable ambition for Willamette to have the best athletic field in the Northwest. He is instilling some of his enthusiasm into the hearts of the students, with a result that every evening scores of them are appearing in their overalls and working clothes to do the bidding of the energetic coach.

Dr. Sweetland's plan is to level off the field and to raise it in the center about two feet, sloping it toward the sides so that there will be a perfect drainage.
