

NEW RATES FOR OREGON AND WASHINGTON

RAILROAD COMMISSIONS OF BOTH STATES WORKING OUT A NEW TRIAL TARIFF SCHEDULE REDUCTION OF 20 PER CENT PROBABLE.

Simultaneously with the issuance of an order by the Washington railroad commission calling into existence a new distance tariff for that state, and an order by the Inter-state commerce commission applicable to both that state and Oregon, the railroad commission for Oregon will about the middle of next month issue a new distance tariff which will reduce the present rate from 15 to 20 per cent.

The railroad commission for this state has been working on such a tariff for some time, and the above announcement was made by Railroad Commissioner Campbell today when questioned in relation to the subject. The railroad commission of Washington has been working on a similar tariff and while the commission for this state would be ready to make its order sooner, it desires to wait until the Washington commission is ready as the railroads to be effected are so interlaced that this will operate beneficially for both states. In addition to that the orders of the two state commissions will only extend to the boundary lines of the states and an order is necessary from the Inter-state Commerce Commission to carry the plan into effect.

For a year or more the commission of this state has contemplated such a move. The granting of reduced distributive rates for the coast cities by the Inter-state commerce commission has made it feasible and the rate will be used as a basis by the commission in fixing the rates for the new distance tariff.

At the present rates are out of proportion to the distributive rates. The commission began its investigation several months ago and a final hearing was set for December 13. The railroad companies, however, asked for an extension of 10 days in which to complete their briefs and it has been granted them. That will bring the final hearing along the first part of next month. The Washington commission is experiencing some trouble and is delayed in its work, and this will probably delay the issuance of the order making the reduction until along the middle of next month.

It will effect every railroad in the state, and will make a sweeping reduction.

SAY WALLA WALLA RIVER POLLUTED BY SEWAGE

Discovering that sewage put into the Walla Walla river by the city of Walla Walla is polluting the stream to the extent that it is injuring ranchers in Oregon, the state board of health at a meeting held this afternoon at the state house directed the secretary to notify the city authorities to take measures to abate the nuisance.

The board also decided to not endorse the hypo-chloride of lime system installed at Eugene and also by the state here for the purification of the water. Certain matters have arisen which makes the members believe that it should not be used save for temporary purification.

All members of the board were present at the meeting.

STATE NEWS.

The Dalles stopped the showing of pictures of "New York's Chinatown" with a representation of the famous Elsie Selgel trunk murder case on the request of 100 Chinese residents. Eugene is seeking a site for a city hall.

Of the last 23 deaths in Lane county only three were women, and in October there were 14 deaths, all men.

Portland's "Rose Festival" is to be made a permanent affair, the railroads all endorsing the plan.

The Hood River commercial club is to visit the Portland club in the near future.

The election at Springfield, wherein, under the home rule law, that city voted "wet," is to be tested in the courts.

In an Albany divorce case Wednesday the husband testified that his wife left their 9-months-old baby lying on a pile of chips in the yard, while there was two inches of snow on the ground, and while she went to visit a neighbor a mile away. He got the divorce.

Co-operative grocery stores, in which the public owns all the stock, have been sanctioned by the Portland city council, and the experiment will soon be given a trial.

Pacific college, at Newberg, has begun a campaign to raise \$100,000. William McClane, a pioneer of 1852, and aged 82 years, died at Silverton Monday.

Astoria voted on the commission form of government Wednesday and turned it down by a 3 to 1 vote.

C. A. Johns, of Baker City, is expected to announce his candidacy for the U. S. senate, to succeed Bourne, in a short time.

Josephine miners are preparing a fine exhibit of ores taken from mines in the county, which will be shown at the mining congress in Grants Pass January 17 and -18.

Klamath Falls will build and own its own water system.

A sale of 120,000,000 feet of timber in the Whitman forest reserve has been made, with the purchasers having four years to cut and move it. Applications are in to purchase that much more in the same reserve.

The Corvallis postal savings bank has deposits amounting to \$3160. It was established four months ago.

Milton Hale, one of the state's earlier pioneers, died at Albany Thursday, aged 90 years. He built one of the first houses in Linn county.
