The Inheritance Tax—At the request of State Treasurer Kay, Attorney General Crawford today rendered an opinion on the question as to when an inheritance vests in an heir so as to become subject to the inheritance tax law of the state. The decedent in the case submitted, died in 1908, and in 1909 the legislature passed a law amending the old law by reducing the tax. The question was as to whether the inheritance vested at once in the heir and became subject to the operation of the old law, or whether it came within the purview of the amended law. The attorney held that it vested at once and that the old law was applicable.
