

IS MAX SCOW THE MAN WHOM POLICE WANT?

ARRESTED ON SUSPICION HE IS FOUND TO HAVE SEVERAL GOODLY BANK ACCOUNTS—ANSWERS DESCRIPTION OF HIGHWAYMAN, BUT EVIDENCE IS LACKING.

"Is C. Max Scow, a man of fine appearance, well dressed, and with a substantial bank account to his credit, the highwayman who last week terrorized the people of the city and baffled the police?" is the question which is perplexing Chief of Police Hamilton.

Scow was arrested by Officer Burkhardt. Two boys had observed him seated under the grand stand at the ball grounds, cleaning two revolvers, and reported it to the police. When Officer Burkhardt arrived upon the scene Scow was still there, and he was placed under arrest, but no weapons could be found on his person or about the premises. A search of the premises, however, revealed several paper bags with pocketbooks in them, one of them containing 40 cents.

Upon searching his person several bank books were found, and also considerable correspondence with banks. One of them shows that he has on deposit with Ashley & Rumelin, of Portland, \$127.96; that in April he had on deposit with the Union Savings Bank, of Redland, California, \$155; another that he has \$1401 on deposit with the German Savings Bank, of Los Angeles.

He declines to talk on the subject of his arrest or with relation to the crime with which he is charged. He answers in detail the description given the officers of the highwayman.

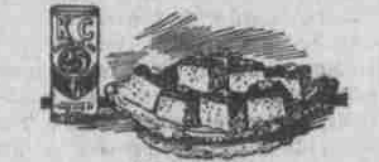

Nut Cake

Simply Delicious
By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

In giving this recipe, Mrs. Hill believes it to be one of the best all-around cake recipes it has been her good fortune to make. The simplicity and uniformly good results will appeal to every housewife



K C Nut Cake
One-half cup butter; 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar; 3/4 cup milk; 2 cups flour; 2 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; 1 cup of nut meats chopped fine; whites of 4 eggs, beaten dry.

Sift flour and baking powder together, three times. Cream the butter, add the sugar; then alternately, the milk and the flour mixture; lastly the whites of eggs and the nut meats. Bake in a sheet in a shallow pan thirty or forty minutes. When cold cover with the icing and decorate with whole nut meats. This is also an excellent white cake recipe when nuts are omitted.

Chocolate Icing
One cup granulated sugar; 1/2 ounce chocolate; white of 1 egg, beaten dry; 1/2 teaspoonful vanilla extract; 1/4 cup water.

Stir the sugar, chocolate and water until the mixture boils; cover and let boil three minutes. Uncover and let boil till when tested in cold water a soft ball may be formed; beat into the white of egg, then beat until cold, add vanilla.
