**VISIT CAPITAL CITY**

The Silverton Athletic club quintet  
will meet the Baroco club at the local  
Y. M. C. A. tonight in what promises  
to be one of the fastest games of the  
season. The local boys, since their  
last game with the C. B. C., have  
been practicing their new plays, and  
under the able coaching of DeTharpe,  
have developed such teamwork and  
speed that will give the Silverton ath-  
letes something to break up. However,  
the Silverton boys have made a very  
enjoyable record, so far this season  
having scored 183 points to their op-  
ponents' 49, and in this game they will  
fight to a finish, as it practically de-  
cides the club championship for the  
Willamette, as the visiting club is con-  
sidered to be the best in the valley.

**Fox Guilty of Sedition.**

Tacoma, Jan. 13.—Jay Fox, editor

found guilty of sedition by a superior  
court jury, and is held awaiting sen-  
tence. The Home Colony is an alleged  
anarchistic community near Tacoma,

the nude, both sexes intermingling.

**Willamette Rising.**  
[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]  
Portland, Ore., Jan. 13.—With leaps  
and bounds the Willamette river here  
is on its way to the flood stage, and  
by noon tomorrow, it is expected to  
reach a stage where some of the lower  
floods will be submerged. The river  
rose three feet in the last 24 hours.

Rainfall during the past 24 hours,  
together with the mild temperature,  
which has melted the snows in the  
higher places tributary to the Willa-  
mette, has caused the rise.

### Three Years for Grafting.

Columbus, O., Jan. 13.—Convicted  
of complicity in wholesale grafting  
in the Ohio legislature, Rodney Del-  
gle, former sergeant at arms of the  
state senate, was sentenced today to  
serve three years in the penitentiary.

His attorneys filed a brief with the  
supreme court appealing the case.  
Arguments will be heard January 23.

**Diaz Will Abdicade.**  
Bluefields, Nicaragua, Jan. 13.—  
Semi-official announcement was made  
here today that President Adolph Diaz  
will abdicate in favor of General Luis  
Mena.

Diaz sails next week for New Or-  
leans, ostensibly on a three-months'  
tour. He is not expected to return.  
The army has been backing Mena's  
claim to the presidency.
