CAGE DROPS: FOUR KILLED, 76 HURT

Danville, Ill., Jan. 31.—Four men are dying and 76 others are seriously injured as the result of a mine cage dropping 200 feet near here today. The engineer lost control of the machinery.

DISPATCHES SAY EMPEROR HAS ABDICATED

London, Jan. 31.—Dispatches received here today from Tien Tsin say that the emperor of China and the Manchú princes have signed articles of abdication, but will remain for a month at Peking, owing to the threats to shoot them if they try to leave.

Hundreds of natives, the dispatches say, have taken refuge in the foreign quarter of Tien Tsin, and an outbreak of the imperial troops is imminent.

TO RE-OPEN A FAMOUS OLD MINE

THE EUREKA MINE, NOW OWNED BY HETTY GREEN, AND WHICH YIELDED ALVINZA HAYWARD \$20,000,000, IS TO BE WORKED AGAIN.

San Francisco, Jan. 31.—The famed old Eureka mine at Sutter creek, which netted Alvinza Hayward \$20,000,000, it was learned today, is to be put into operation again by Colonel Edward H. R. Green, son of Hetty Green, its present owner. Since a disastrous fire, 20 years ago, swept off the buildings, and left the 2200-foot shaft to cave in and become impassable, the mine has been idle, and because four lives were lost in the fire, Mrs. Green has persistently refused to reopen the mine for further development.

Many Pacific coast promoters from time to time sought Mrs. Green in New York, to purchase the mine, but she invariably turned down offers of \$2,000,000, the amount her husband paid Hayward for the property.

She demanded \$2,600,000 for the mine just as it stood.

Colonel Green, who is in San Francisco, is going to visit the mine and probably will order work to start at once to clear the ruins, preparatory to reviving the property.

MAY SETTLE MATTER BY ARBITRATION

When the Bartenders' union holds its meeting Sunday—for that is the only day in which a bartender really has an hour of rest, the members will probably be confronted with the proposition of arbitrating the question of difference existing between them and the saloon men with relation to the scale of wages to be paid in the city.

The union asked that the low scale of wages be fixed at \$18 per week. The saloon men's reply—a majority of them—was a refusal and the tearing down of the union cards in their establishments. Since then, however, the other unions of the city have taken a hand in the fight, and the saloon men are thinking better of it, and it is understood that they are suggesting arbitration.

The other unions are now coming to the assistance of the bartenders. Letters have been sent out that any member of the different unions of the city who are caught patronizing the two non-union saloons in the city will be fined. It is believed that this will effectually put a boycott on these institutions so far as union men are concerned.

ROOSEVELT AND WILSON ARE LEADING

In The Capital Journal's straw vote Roosevelt and Wilson are leading all other candidates.

Geo. L. Cleaver, Imbler, Ore., which is in Union county, sends in a petition for Roosevelt, and says in a letter: "Voters are registering very slowly, but I only found one Taft Republican, and one La Follette man, in the whole lot now registered in this precinct. This would indicate 90 per cent of the Republican voters here favorable to Roosevelt."
