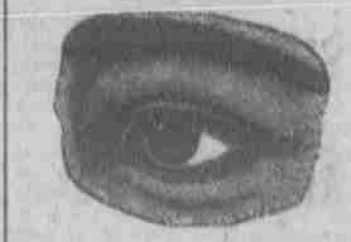

Appoints Delegates—Governor West today appointed J. S. A. Waters, of Astoria; James Dart, of St. Helens, and A. W. Cauthorne, H. L. Barclay and Lester Shipp, of Portland, as delegates to the convention of the hundredth anniversary of peace among the English speaking people. The convention will be held in New York.
