THE EAST WILL SEEK THE WEST

MANY ILLINOIS FARMERS WILL TREK TO OREGON, MONTANA AND WASHINGTON THE COMING SPRING.

St. Paul, Feb. 27.—Daily reports received from the Oregon-Montana Land show on wheels, which is being operated by the Great Northern Railway through Illinois, have been very favorable. Mr. E. C. Leedy, general immigration agent of the Great Northern Railway, thinks that in spite of the great expense of operating and maintaining the Oregon-Montana Exhibition car, that the results will be astonishing. "I base these conclusions," said Mr. Leedy, "on the daily confidential reports received from the immigration agents on the car. In spite of the cold weather, the fact that these farmers of the mid-west will come miles and miles in the most disagreeable sort of weather, shows that they are vitally interested.

For example, the car was in Peoria, Illinois, January 19, 20, 22 and 23. We had advertised this in advance." Taking up a report from his desk, Mr. Leedy said, "for interest, good Great Northern advertising, the four days' stay at this point breaks all previous records. Never in the history of this car have they been overrun with genuine seekers of information as has been the case at this point. We were obliged to hold small lectures in the car in order to talk to all the people who were interested. We found a number who contemplate trips to Oregon in the near future. We found others who will make a trip to Glacier National Park in Montana next summer. A number are going to Portland, Oregon and to the fertile Willamette Valley. Others were more interested in the free lands in Central Oregon. I believe there will be a great number of people going from Peoria to Oregon and Montana points this spring."

Mississippi River Frozen Over at Warsaw.

At Warsaw, Illinois, the weather was so cold that the great Mississippi river was completely frozen over and people from three states, Illinois, Iowa and Missouri, came across the river and visited the Oregon-Montana car. Our assistant immigration agent with the car estimates that 3,000 people came to the lectures in the car in two days. The newspapers gave us good publicity and people seemed interested in almost every district in Oregon and Montana.

At Laharpe, they had a large attendance and people showed interest in our new Glacier National Park, in Montana. Homeseekers from this point will go to the free lands in Montana and Central Oregon. "At Blandinsville," continued Mr. Leedy, "the people came in such crowds in the afternoon, it was almost impossible for us to handle them all for a while. The people stood in a long line in front of the car waiting impatiently to get in. Hundreds of bulletins about Montana and Oregon were given out. Practically all the farmers within a radius of five miles came to the car. We certainly did some very effective work. The interest in the free lands and the homesteads of Montana and Central Oregon was very great, but among the older and richer farmers, the fruit lands of Oregon and Montana were also very attractive."

LOS ANGELES STRIKERS WIN THEIR FIGHT

London, Feb. 26.—Adding to the intense excitement today pervading Great Britain because of the critical point reached in the negotiations relating to the gigantic coal strike impending, a report was widely circulated that Premier Asquith has determined in the event of a national coal strike, to take over and work temporarily all coal mines and thus prevent a panic in prices.

The association of mine owners in South Wales and the executive committee, of the South Wales Miners' federation, today are holding separate meetings in Cardiff. Much importance is attached to their meetings, as they represent the most stubborn elements and it is believed their decisions will influence materially the national conference of miners tomorrow.

The miners who laid down their tools today were but a few thousand in number and were employed in Derbyville.

On Trial for Shooting Capitalist

Redwood City, Cal., Feb. 26.—The trial of Samuel R. Timothy, a chauffeur, who shot and killed John J. Moore, capitalist and clubman, in a revolver duel, opened here today before Superior Judge George H. Buck. Mrs. Lillian Moore, widow of the slain capitalist, is expected to take the stand.

In a statement signed just before his death, Moore admitted that he fired the first shot, believing that Mrs. Moore was with Timothy on an automobile ride. Both Mrs. Moore and Timothy have denied this.

The courtroom was crowded when the trial began, despite the fact that it was believed the entire day would be consumed in securing a jury.

The shooting of Moore followed a sensational divorce suit in which both Moore and his wife sought freedom. Judge Buck finally ruling that neither was entitled to a decree.

MILLIONAIRE GENEROUS TO HIS CHILDREN

New York, Feb. 26.—Henry Phipps, millionaire and former partner of Andrew Carnegie, it was learned here today, has handed out a bunch of presents, amounting to \$3,000,000. He gave \$1,000,000 to each of his three sons, John S., Henry Carnegie and Howard. The gifts are in Chicago real estate.

Phipps says he gave away the property because he did not want to be bothered with the annoying details of looking after it.
