Pay Is 45 Cents an Hour.

Ed. Journal: Some parties are peddling the story that the board of county commissioners, is paying \$6 per day for man and team to work on the reform school hill road, which is not the fact, and those telling the story are either purposely or unknowingly repeating a falsehood. The commissioner's court pays 45 cents an hour for man and team and it pays the same, no matter where employed—and that is what is being paid on the job referred to.

Timber and Taxation.

Ed. Journal: I noticed in a late issue of the Capital Journal, some comment about assessing timber lands and calling the attention of the assessors to a statement of a Mr. Knapp, of Portland, who has figured that an average section of timber land in Oregon would be worth \$600,000 in manufactured form.

I consider this comment misleading, as many people would infer that timber lands are not assessed high enough; while the fact of the matter is timber lands are being assessed higher accordingly, and generally pay a higher levy of taxes than the average farming lands. According to the public press, State Treasurer Kay has repeatedly stated, "that he has learned from his experiences in loaning state school funds that farming lands throughout the state are assessed at about one-third actual value as a rule." But timber lands are being assessed at from about two-thirds to full value and sometimes higher; while scattering settlers in timbered districts are voting excessive special school and road taxes, extensively and generally unjustly, simply as a legal grafting proposition, to be paid mostly by those that have no voice in the matter. I own a Siletz claim upon which I must pay 24 1/2 mills tax; while there is a timbered district in the Elkhorn precinct in Marion that the levy is 29.7 mills; just a fraction higher than your levies in the city of Salem.

I understand that the Curtis Lumber company, of Mill City, which had a \$40,000 forest fire last year, and a \$100,000 fire the season before, owns much timber in such school and road districts, where excessive tax levies are being voted; yet, I have been reliably informed that such company has operated at a loss for the last two years on account of such forest fires. The same high-handed methods are being practiced in the timbered districts all over Oregon: a few scattering settlers with little property, voting thousands of dollars in road taxes; having one of their own number as road supervisor, and hiring themselves the season through, at \$2.50 per day of eight hours for a man or \$5 for a man and team; practically all at the expense of non-resident timber owners.

Is such procedure fair and just to the owners of timber that is unavailable at present, and will not be for many years. Are such methods to be tolerated in encouraging conservation and re-forestation of timbered districts?

In regard to your comment about Mr. Knapp's statement, will say that a similar statement could be made about the undeveloped gravel bars along the Willamette river. It would not take a gravel bar of one acre to manufacture \$1,000 worth of sewer or drainage pipe; hence it would not take a section of gravel bars to be worth \$600,000 in manufactured form. The assessors should not overlook the undeveloped gravel bars, according to logic, similar to yours about timber lands.

Is it wise to pursue a course that is preventing the investment of capital from other states in Oregon timber?

A TUNEFUL CREATOR OF WALTZES

SOME OF THE MOST CATCHY MUSIC OF RECENT YEARS THE KIND YOU CATCH YOURSELF HUMMING WILL BE HEARD TONIGHT.

The name of Jean Briquet is a household word in Paris, the city which dearly loves him and his music, but in this country it is only recently that he has acquired any vogue. Like Franz Lehar of "Merry Widow" fame he flashed across the country with one of the most tuneful of waltzes. It is called "Alma, Where Do You Live?" and from it the German-French farce which Joe Weber will present for the first time in English at the Grand Opera House tonight takes its name.

"Alma" first became popular in New York when the piece was produced in German at the German theater, under the management of Adolph Phillip. It proved so attractive that Joe Weber immediately secured the American rights to it. He had an English book done by George V. Hobart and had American lyrics written to the haunting melodies of Briquet. The entire original score of Briquet, 14 numbers in all will be heard here. The music has not the fault of being so familiar as to be tiresome. It is too dainty and above the ordinary for that.

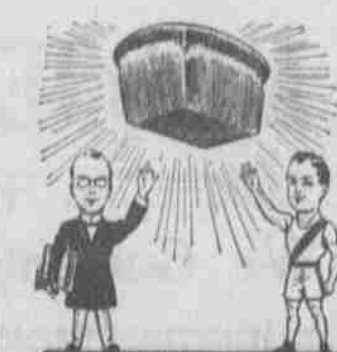
