The Peterson case attracted considerable attention in court some weeks ago, when it was very warmly contested on account of property rights, which were finally settled out of court.

Wants a Dam Site—The Willamette Power company has filed a suit in the circuit court against the Hammond Lumber company in which it seeks to condemn 49 acres of land on the Breitenbush creek in the Cascade mountains for the site for a dam. Riparian rights as to a certain amount of water in the creek is also made a part of the complaints.

Homyer, of Salem.

A Venerable Indian. White Salmon, Wash., March 21.—Jake Hunt, oldest Klickitat Indian in the Northwest, aged 112 years, who owns considerable land on the White Salmon river, rode into town Saturday for a packload of supplies. He is the wealthiest Indian in this section, his wealth including land and cash deposited in local banks, being estimated at \$100,000. He owns a very comfortable house furnished with modern conveniences. He is an inveterate smoker, has used tobacco all his life, and sits a horse like a young man of 30. He is illiterate, but is practical, and is possessed of a keen sense of wit.

HUMPHREYS MURDERED HIS MOTHER

Corvallis, Or., March 21.—That the last victim of George Humphrey, already charged with four murders, was his mother, is alleged here today.

Mrs. King, his mother, died suddenly some weeks ago. It was said she died of paralysis. It is now alleged Humphreys may have poisoned her.

It is being urged that the body of Mrs. King be exhumed and a search for poison instituted.

According to George Humphrey's brother Charley, the former murdered Mrs. Ella Griffith, George Selby, William King, his stepfather and John Damrose during the last six years. Charley admits he was accomplice in the Griffith murder.

HARRIS IS SET FREE BY THE JUDGE

New York, March 21.—By decision of Judge Seabury a jury today returned a verdict in favor of Isaac Harris and Max Blank, proprietors of the Triangle Shirt Waist company, on one of the indictments resulting from the fire in their factory a year ago, in which a score of girls met death.

Judge Seabury decided that the defendants already had once been in jeopardy, and all pending indictments against them were dismissed.

FOR WIDOWS AND DESERTED MOTHERS

St. Louis, March 21.—Penalons for widowed and deserted mothers are urged in a report made today to the National Mothers' congress, in session here, by Mary Garrett, chairman of the legislation committee.

The report also urges investigation of the care received by children in orphan asylums, and demands laws regulating child labor and providing medical inspection of factories.

Mrs. Garrett, who is connected with the Philadelphia Juvenile court, announced that the congress probably would adopt a resolution endorsing a government children's bureau with a woman in charge.

CHINA CAN GET NO MORE MONEY NOW

Peking, March 21.—Until President Yuan Shi Kai issues a definite statement in regard to Chinese financial policy with a guarantee of good faith, no further loans will be made the Chinese republic, according to a decision reached by representatives of the "six nations" group of financiers, which includes America, England, France, Germany, Russia and Japan.

Dispatches from Tientsin today say that Yuan Shi Kai has been obliged to postpone the payment of the monthly pension of the former emperor, owing to lack of funds.

New York, March 21.—United States customs officers today seized most of the personal effects of Mrs. Blanche M. Carson, the San Francisco society woman who committed suicide by hanging here yesterday after being arrested on a charge of smuggling valuable jewels into this country.

The belongings were transferred to the appraisers' store rooms, where they will be held pending the arrival of Mrs. Carson's brother, Paul Mayberry, from Los Angeles.

BIG STEAMER IS STRANDED ON THE LAKES

Milwaukee, March 21.—Stranded in a dangerous position one mile from shore, a big steamer was sighted in distress in Lake Michigan a mile from here today. The vessel is believed to be the Conestoga, with a crew of 12 on board. Lifesavers are en route.

Wireless messages later confirmed the report that the vessel is Conestoga. The steamer is caught in an ice floe. The Conestoga carried a crew of 12. There are no passengers aboard.

GRANTS PASS WILL OFFER SEVERAL PRIZES

Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction Cawton returned last evening from Grants Pass, where he conferred with the Grants Pass Poultry association with relation to prizes for the industrial fair for the county of which the town is the county seat.

The association has decided to give prizes for 27 products, and all of the prizes will consist of poultry. There will be first, second and third prizes, consisting in all of 324 brooded chickens.

An Orator, Though.

Fresno, Cal., March 21.—After spending most of a season as an orator in a vigorous local option campaign, Rev. Samuel Hughes, British, has denied citizenship papers. He could not tell how the president of the United States is elected.

THE THIRD BILL IS FOR EQUAL SUFFRAGE

[UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Phoenix, Ariz., March 21.—A bill providing for a woman suffrage amendment to the Arizona constitution was introduced in the legislature today. It was the third measure brought before the solons of the new state. Women lobbyists for the measure appear confident that it will carry, and be placed before the voters.

Carson Gets a Reprieve.

[UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Sacramento, Cal., March 21.—Charles Carson, who was to have been hanged tomorrow at Folsom prison, was granted a reprieve of 60 days by Governor Johnson at noon today at the request of Warden Riley. Carson is believed to be insane.

While under a life sentence at Folsom, Carson participated in an outbreak at the prison some time ago and under the law, the penalty for such an offense is death.
