"REBECCA OF SUNNYBROOK FARM" IS JUST THE PLAY TO PLEASE EVERYONE, WHOLESOME, SWEET AND CLEAN.

Novelty setting will mark several of the scenes in "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," which is to be brought to Salem for the first time at the Grand opera house Saturday night, April 6. Great oaks shade the veranda and climbing vines make picturesque the ancient brick. The house is the home of Miranda and Jane Sawyer, Rebecca's stern old aunts whose Puritan training and New England natures have brought much tribulation to the ebullient Rebecca. It is the only brick house in Riverboro, and so enjoys the distinction that gives prestige to the habitats of the place.

AN EXAMPLE OF MODERN JUSTICE

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE] San Francisco, April 5.—"Selling lottery tickets, your honor," said the big policeman who supported dim-eyed, palsied, poor old Jane Zugarewski, long past three score years, to the bar of Police Judge Sullivan's court here yesterday.

"I am too old and too weak to work, judge," said the aged woman, tears streaming down her cheeks. "I had to sell tickets for the lottery company to live." And she went to jail for 20 days.

It is only a few blocks from Judge Sullivan's court room where the M. & F. lottery handed out the tickets which sent Jane Zugarewski to jail. Their offices are luxurious.

There are at least four lottery companies operating in San Francisco in open defiance of the laws. Their tickets are peddled openly in every street in the city.

And in the corridor of the very court room, when Jane went to jail half a dozen able-bodied men were selling lottery tickets at the very moment her punishment was meted out.

SUIT OVER STOCK DEAL IS SETTLED

ANNOUNCEMENT MADE THAT THE ORIOLE COMPANY REPURCHASES STOCK HELD BY EYRE AND CASE IS DROPPED.

Supreme Court and Library Building

Notice to Contractors.

Sealed proposals for the excavation and concrete foundation work required for the state supreme court and library building to be erected in the city of Salem, Oregon, will be opened by the board of public building commissioner, at 2 p. m., Monday, April 15th, 1912, at the state capitol building, Salem, Oregon. Plans and specifications may be obtained at the office of W. C. Knighton, architect, capitol building, Salem. Contractors will be required to deposit \$10 for each set of plans as a guarantee that the plans and specifications received by them will be returned to the office in good condition on or before the date set for opening bids. On return of said drawings, the money will be refunded. A certified check for \$1500 must accompany each proposal and drawn to the order of R. A. Watson, clerk of the board of public building commissioners, to guarantee that bidder will enter into a contract and execute the required bond; same shall be forfeited to the state of Oregon if award of contract is made to bidder and he or they fail to enter into a contract and furnish the required bond within 10 days from date of award of contract. Proposals shall be made only on the form furnished by the architect. The right is reserved to accept or reject any or all bids, or to waive any informalities in bids.

THEY WANT REPORT TO BE PUBLIC

New York, April 5.—The lumber men of the country today are directly challenging the policies of the department of commerce and labor at Washington and demanding that the department "come out into the open" with the result of its year's investigation of the alleged "lumber trust."

The National Lumber Manufacturers' association, the national organization of the sawmills of the country, representing 36 per cent of the total lumber manufacture, has addressed letters to President Taft demanding the publication of the findings of the department of commerce and labor in order "that the people of this country may no longer have to depend for their opinion as to the lumber producing industry upon insinuations, unverified charges, suspicion or prejudices."

The investigation by the department of commerce labor was ordered by congress in December 1906, for the purpose of discovering whether the lumber industry was controlled by a combination in restraint of trade and whether the combination fixed and controlled prices. No report was made for three years. In January, 1910, the lumber interests had an interview with President Taft and, they claim, were assured that the result of the investigation would be made public within 30 days. Last December the lumbermen renewed their request upon the president for a report. Secretary Nagel replied that the department was conducting other inquiries and had not had time to complete the investigation. On March 1, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association made a final appeal to President Taft for a "verdict" on the investigations. The lumbermen express appreciation of Secretary Nagel's acknowledgement that there is no one dominant corporation in the lumber industry and show that it takes 55¢ of the largest sawmills to produce one-third of the annual cut.

The final letter of the lumbermen urges that the industry be shown justice by the prompt publication of the findings of the department. The letter concludes as follows:

"We also request the courtesy of a further reply, which we would be glad to make public, together with this letter, to the end that the public may understand that the lumber industry does not avoid an interview but on the contrary, welcomes it and desires that its results be given the widest publicity."

Banks Set New Record.

Bank clearings in Portland yesterday aggregated \$3,596,898, the highest figure on record. The previous record was \$3,289,484, on April 19, 1911.

This remarkable showing is due in part to the transfer of funds from the sheriff to the county treasurer following the close of the tax collection period, but the great bulk of the business represented the regular volume of trade, which constantly is growing.

The largest paper mill of its kind in the world will be built by the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper Co., at Oregon City this summer.

The Fallon sugar factory is trying to induce Lake county farmers to grow sugar beets.
