Will Probated.
The will of William E. Flesher was admitted to probate Friday in probate court by Judge Dushay. Flesher died in this city April 1, leaving an estate estimated to be worth \$1000, of which there are six heirs. Rachael S. Flesher, the widow, was appointed executrix of the will. The appraisers appointed by Judge Dushay are J. E. Flahood, Elmer E. Martin and John Hyatt. The six heirs are the widow, one son, one daughter and three grand children, sons of Lola Lockwood, who is also deceased.

Too Much Gore.
Nora E. Gore filed a suit for divorce against Whitney T. Gore, Saturday, alleging "cruel and inhuman treatment. There are no children as a result of the marriage, which occurred in Cleveland, Ohio, November 28, 1908. Mrs. Gore alleges that he defendant is worth in the neighborhood of \$40,000, \$20,000 of which is in bonds, notes and mortgages and that he also owns a valuable farm of 100 acres in Indiana. She asks to have her maiden name of Cuzzort restored to her.

Taxes Paid Promptly.
A great many complaints are made against the high taxes and of the consequent hardships that are being heaped upon the taxpayers of this county and no better idea of the thrift and prosperity of the county can be given than the fact that of a total of \$238,322.19, \$795,827.69 has already been collected. The rebates on the taxes collected amount to \$20,254.37, which properly should be deducted from the amount to be collected. This leaves \$122,210.13 yet to be collected, which is a remarkably good showing for this season of the year.
