### Plenty of Opium.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Francisco, April 10.—Five hundred thousand dollars worth of contrabanded opium now believed to be stored in bonded warehouses in San Francisco is expected to be seized and destroyed by the state board of pharmacy, as a result of a decision rendered today by Collector of Port Stratton, that the United States government has no right to interfere with the seizure of the drug. The decision followed the refusal to turn over \$21,000 of opium here to officers of the state board of pharmacy on Tuesday.

### Hicks Trial Ends Tonight.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Or., April 10.—Arguments consumed the entire day in the trial of Bert Hicks, open shop machine works operator, charged with the murder of W. A. Wortman, union picket. Attorney Logan for the defense bitterly denounced Prosecutor Davis, who in his argument had said that Logan had used improper methods in his conduct of the defense. The case will go to the jury this evening or tomorrow.

## THE CITY OF BUTTE BURNING

### FIRE BROKE OUT AT NOON AND WAS SOON BEYOND CONTROL—WIND IS BLOWING AND CITY MAY BE WIPED OFF THE MAP.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Butte, Mont., April 10.—Fire starting in the wholesale district of Butte shortly after noon today caused a loss of more than \$1,000,000, and is spreading into the business section. All of the fire fighting forces of the city are attempting to check the flames, but have not yet succeeded.

The fire, fanned by a high wind, spread briskly northward toward the center of the city. Four business houses and 30 residences are on fire. Hundreds of volunteers are aiding the regular fire fighting forces. Dynamiting of some structures to save others may be necessary.

## COULD NOT BREAK THEIR DADDY'S WILL

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Francisco, April 10.—John D. and Adolph Spreckels lose their long fight to break the will of their father, the late Claus Spreckels, involving the disposition of property valued at \$10,000,000, by a decision of the state supreme court today, reversing the action of Superior Judge Coffey, who on February 15, 1910, rendered a decision setting aside the trust clause in the will.

When Claus Spreckels died in December, 1908, he left a will decreeing that his estate be held in trust for his widow and two sons, Rudolph and Claus A. John D. and Adolph were ignored in the will. They contested the will and succeeded in getting the ruling from Judge Coffey declaring the trust clause invalid.

Claus and Rudolph Spreckels then brought an appeal to the state supreme court. During the pendency of the matter in the supreme court, Judge Coffey has frequently threatened to distribute the estate to the heirs at law, including John D. and Adolph, but did not do so upon the presentation of petitions by the disinherited sons that he defer action until the supreme court had disposed of the appeal.

**Killed in Sewer.**  
[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Ore., April 10.—John Pupura was killed, and Mike Buzzarra was seriously injured here today when a sewer in which they were working caved in. Both men were buried beneath a pile of rocks, dirt and timbers, and Pupura was smothered to death.

**Inside the Limit.**  
[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, April 10.—Account of the expenditures of Stephen Lowell, United States Senator Bourne's rival in Oregon, was filed today with the senate. The senate shows that Lowell expended \$1,020. He received no contributions.
