**New Incorporation**—Articles of incorporation were filed in the clerk's office today of the Mount Jefferson Power company, with a capital stock of \$5000, divided into 10 shares of \$500 each. The purposes of the company is to own and acquire real estate and power sites, and deal in the same. The incorporators are R. H. Rutherford, M. J. Lanway and Homer Rutherford. The place of business is Salem.

**Secure Depot Grounds**—A report is current on the streets today that an option has been secured by the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company on the property of J. A. and Edward Baker, at the southwest corner of Liberty and Center streets. The price is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$18,000. This is very desirable property for depot and station grounds. However, inquiry has been made of the parties to the deal, but nothing definite can be obtained.

**Work on Branch to Fir**—Mr. F. L. Burchhalter, district engineer of the Southern Pacific company, was in Salem today, and, in an interview, stated that contracts for the construction of the Fir branch would be let within two or three days, and that they expected to have trains running within 90 days after work started. He said that practically all the right of way had been secured, and that everything was in fine shape.

**EVERYBODY GLAD TO SEE LA FOLLETTE**

Dallas, Or., April 15.—Out-of-door speaking today began to affect the voice of Senator LaFollette and he refused to make his scheduled speech from the courthouse steps here. He spoke inside instead and 1,000 men and women jammed the courthouse to hear him.

"I trust I am not defiling this temple of justice," said the senator, as he climbed upon the judge's bench, shoving inkwell and lawbooks aside, before beginning an address on the issues of the campaign. Every business house in Dallas was closed during LaFollette's address.

**Big Crowd at McMinnville.**  
McMinnville, Or., April 15.—Riding 26 miles from Monmouth in a driving rainstorm with one stop at Amity, where he stood in the downpour and addressed 600 farmers, Senator LaFollette arrived here this afternoon and delivered an address before 800 persons in the auditorium. Arrangements had been for an outdoor speech but rain prevented.

Senator LaFollette in his speeches today urged the re-election of United States Senator Bourne.

**Many at Monmouth.**  
Monmouth, Or., April 15.—Clearing weather enabled Senator LaFollette to make an address here from the city grand stand. Before an audience of 400 persons, the senator spoke vigorously in view of women suffrage and on campaign issues.

Half a hundred girls from the state normal school here greeted LaFollette with songs as he drove into Monmouth.

**BASEBALL BEGINS IN PORTLAND**

Portland, Ore., April 10.—With all six teams in fine fettle and each one confident of landing the pennant, the Northwestern league opened its season this afternoon with games scheduled in Seattle, Vernon and Spokane.

Portland opened with Seattle, Victoria with Spokane and Tacoma with Vancouver.

Officials of the league today predicted the most successful season in the history of the organization.

**Got Off Easy**—In the justice court yesterday Tom Riley was given a preliminary hearing on the charge of larceny from a building. He was the man who stole 24 pairs of blankets from the contracting firm of Guthrie, McLaughlin & Co., and sold them to a second-hand store. The accused man admitted the theft of the goods. The punishment for an offense of this character is a sentence in the penitentiary, but Riley was allowed to enter a plea of guilty of simple larceny, the penalty of which would be a jail sentence. Judge Webster sentenced him to 30 days in the county jail.

**Another Flour Mill**—Salem is to have another flour mill. F. W. Geiser has purchased the fractional lot on Trade street between High and Church streets, and will erect a mill there. The lot is 82x108 feet, and the plant will cover almost the entire lot. It will have a capacity of 100 barrels a day, and will be of the latest improved in every respect as to apparatus and machinery. Work will begin on the construction of the building within a week or ten days, and will be rushed to completion as fast as possible. The Southern Pacific company will be asked to construct a siding to the property.

**TO EXAMINE BRIDGE**

The city of Salem is fortunate in getting the services of two competent engineers to inspect the wagon bridge across the Willamette river here. Messrs. Smith and Burkholder, engineers of the Oregon Electric, were in the city today, and made an inspection and investigation of the bridge, to determine just what will be necessary by way of investigation. These engineers will make tests of the steel used in the construction of the bridge, with a view to finding out whether it is crystallized to such an extent as to render it incapable of further service. They will also send a diver to the bottom of the river, to inspect the foundations of the piers, and the whole matter will be gone over in a systematic and scientific manner, so as to fully determine the tensile strength of every portion of the bridge.
