WANT STATE TO FURNISH EMPLOYMENT

Sacramento, Cal., April 17.—With a view to thinning the ranks of the unemployed in California, the socialist party here is today preparing to send throughout the state as an initiative measure the "right of employment" bill, which provides for the establishment by the state legislature of labor agencies throughout the state and the inauguration of "state industries" so that there will be work for all citizens who are able and willing to work to earn a living.
One hundred locals of the Socialist party and all central labor bodies in California will be asked to secure signatures to the petition to have the bill placed on the ballot next November.
The plan of the bill is summed up in the following excerpt from its text:
"It shall be the duty of the state, through the agencies employed in that behalf, to give employment direct to its citizens, without the intervention of contractors and at a reasonable living wage; all profits which may ac-

crue from such enterprises to be employed in their extension and betterment, and in defraying the expense of their operation."

OROZCO DECIDES TO BE GOOD

Chihuahua, Mexico, April 17.—General Pascual Orozco performed yesterday a complete right-about-face in deciding to recognize United States Consul Letcher.

The Consul spent an hour and a half with the rebel leader and presented the State Department's pronouncement that American lives and property must be safeguarded and that Mr. Letcher must be allowed to exercise his consular functions in dealing with the rebels.

Orozco said that his previous attitude toward the Consul was due to misinformation brought to him by underlings, and he greatly regretted that consular mail had been interfered with. He agreed to the following five propositions put to him by Mr. Letcher:

1. The Consul must not be further embarrassed by personal and official espionage.
2. Telegrams to officials, or on official business, whether in cipher or otherwise, must not be subjected to unnecessary delay.
3. The Consul has the right to personal conference with the rebel commander at any hour.
4. Mail must not be tampered with or delayed.
5. Americans receive a guarantee of the right of immediate appeal to their Consul, no matter what the charge against them, and the Consul may visit them in prison.

CONTRACTOR ORDERED TO BEGIN WORK

Conditions at the new Carnegie library have not changed materially for the past six weeks. On March 2, while the workmen were putting some of the steel trusses in position, their support gave way and a collapse resulted in which the scaffolding and the trusses fell a distance of about 15 feet. The fall sprung the trusses to such an extent as to make them valueless and new ones will be required before the work can be completed. The collapse of the scaffolding brought out a dispute as to the trusses being strong enough to support the roof and ceiling. The contractors stopped the work and none has been done on that part of the building since. The contractor, J. S. Winters, contended that the trusses were not of sufficient strength to hold the weight to which they would be subjected and the library board and architect Geo. M. Post, holding the opinion that they were of sufficient strength. This condition of affairs has existed ever since the accident and the contractor has been notified twice to resume work. The last notice was sent out yesterday and in all probability was delivered to the contractor today. This notice gave the contractor 48 hours in which to resume work.

As a basis for the contention on the part of the library board that the trusses were of sufficient strength, the opinions of seven practical engineers have been obtained and all express the opinion that the trusses are amply strong for the weight they will be required to carry. Among those submitting reports on matter is the engineer of the Port of Portland and the engineer in charge of the bridges on the extension of the Oregon Electric between here and Albany.

narrative, a great spout of water showed that the boilers had exploded. There must have been at least 30 explosions in the furnace room as the icy waters reached the fires.
The admiralty here computes the Titanic's position at the bottom to be eight miles from the spot where the liner sank. It says that it probably took the vessel 13 minutes to reach the bottom two miles below the surface.

BETTER ENFORCE THE LAWS WE NOW HAVE

Washington, April 17.—The senate foreign committee this afternoon discussed the Titanic disaster at length, its members being of the unanimous opinion that there should be prompt legislation to prevent a repetition of the horror. The committee agreed that the commerce committee has sole jurisdiction in the matter.
It is believed congress will be empowered to regulate the equipments of foreign vessels entering American ports.

SHE STILL BELIEVES IN HUSBAND

Oakland, Cal., April 17.—Anna Milbrath, the Oakland girl, who was duped into a marriage with "Sir" Harry Westwood Cooper, the paroled convict, who fled with her to London when the police sought him for attempting to pass a fictitious check for \$15,000 on an Oakland bank, has been located. In a telegram received by her father today from Ben Milbrath, a brother, it is stated that the girl is in Gary, Ind., with her aunt. She refuses to believe that Dr. Milton Abraham, under which name Cooper married her, is the notorious ex-convict.

The telegram reads as follows:
"Anna here, safe. Direct from London alone. Cooper last in London April 6. Came on Campania from Liverpool. He traveled under assumed name. She does not believe he is man wanted by prison officials. She says no scar on forehead and no mark on arm."
The police were advised Tuesday that Cooper had been seen in London, where he had deserted his latest bride Washington has been asked to request the London police to apprehend him.

COMPANY HAS KEPT ITSELF WITHIN THE LAW

Confronted with employment contracts showing that men were imported from Chicago to Portland by the Harriman railroad lines to break the strike in the machine shops there, Labor Commissioner Hoff finds himself unable to prosecute the companies as the law only makes it an offense when the company fails to warn the men imported that there is a strike on.

The labor commissioner made an investigation of the subject in compliance with reports and complaints made to him. These complaints were to the effect that the railroad companies were importing men without advising them that there was a strike on. When he conversed with some of those imported he found that these complaints were corroborated but an examination of their contracts showed that they had agreed to take the places of men in employment of the company who were now on a strike. The only explanation for the affairs is that the men in signing the contracts did so hurriedly and failed to notice the clause in the contract.

MANY ACCIDENTS WERE REPORTED DURING MARCH

According to the monthly report of Labor Commissioner Hoff, which was just issued to the public today, there 316 were injured in the various industries of the state during the month of March, six of them proving fatal. Most of the injuries during the month, according to the statement, occurred in the sawmills.

MEN'S OXFORDS

FLOOD OF COLONISTS IS COMING

Two thousand three hundred and forty four cars of immigrant goods, representing the personal effects of 11,720 colonists, were handled through the Twin City transfer during March by the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Milwaukee and St. Paul and the Soo Line.

These people were ticketed for the Pacific northwest. The first four days of April showed a greater average per day in the people still moving than any day during March. The reduced passenger and freight rates under which the colonists moved continued until April 15, and officials of the railroads expect almost as many people to pass through St. Paul and Minneapolis during April as during the month of March.

The moveables are coming from all sections of the United States. It is a significant thing that the trains of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railroads which start from St. Paul show the greatest increase in the number of colonists carried. The trains from Chicago do not show

such an increase. This indicates that people from the middle west are the ones who are moving and not the "down easters."

The movement of colonists is said by railroad officials to be greater than ever this year due to the northwestern states obtaining publicity throughout the country and particularly to the efforts being made by those states to show the farmers of the middle west just exactly what the American Northwest can produce.

At the office of the Northwest Development League it is said that there are more commercial clubs and business organizations doing active and intelligent work to secure settlers than ever before. It is said that more than 6,000 cars of immigrant goods will go into the American Northwest during 1912.
