Hood before he left Oregon. The words were scarcely out of his mouth when his head dropped over and he was dead. Heart failure was the cause. Mr. Nasmith was accompanied by his wife, who is at the Marion hotel, completely prostrated over the sad affair.

Both were old people. The body was taken from the train at Salem, where arrangements will be made for its shipment to the family home.
