

# "THE SOUL KISS" AT THE GRAND

### FIRST OF THE TABLOID VERSIONS OF SOME OF THE BIG PRODUCTIONS ARRANGED FOR BY MANAGER WATERS.

"The Soul Kiss", which is the first of the tabloid versions of the big productions, will be with us at the Grand this evening and Tuesday, with special matinee tomorrow. From reports the newness and the abundance of interest that has already been applied to the production is still retained. The old actor of the last decade, whose singing recitation of "There Were Actors Then" seems to still merit the applause as of old. The comedy is still greater, it appears in the tabloid version, for in the boiling process, the fun has been made prominent. Among the artists in the program are Diana Bonnar, Vivian Whitman, Anne Clarke, Imogene Mansfield, Virginia McAdams, Louise Darling, Arline Fuller, Hazel Winters, and Cecil Hunter and the Messrs. ## COMMERCE COMMISSION CAN NOW BOSS ALASKA

Washington, April 29.—A decision in the United States supreme court today authorizes the interstate commerce commission to regulate commerce in Alaska. The commission heretofore contended that it was without such authority under the interstate commerce law.

The court also declared that Alaska is a "territory," and not a "district."

## Thirteen Bodies Recovered.

New York, April 29.—That it had covered the territory between latitude 41.20 and 41.90 and longitude 49 and 49.25 and thus far had recovered but 13 bodies of Titanic victims was the substance of a wireless message received at the offices of the White Star line here today from the cable ship Minia. Other steamers passing the scene of the disaster, saw no bodies and can give no hope to relatives that other corpses will be found.

The message also stated that icebergs in the vicinity were moving south rapidly.

## Can Force Railroads.

Washington, April 29.—By a decision of the United States supreme court today the citizens of the state of Washington won their fight to compel adjacent railroads to connect with lines running through their state.

The decision upheld the constitutionality of the state law authorizing the state railroad commissioners of Washington to enforce such physical connections. The court added, however, that the commission's order in the case was made on insufficient evidence, and set aside that order which affects eight cities in Washington.
