Santa Monica, Cal., May 14.—With a bullet through his chest, alleged to have been fired by Charles W. Harding, Robert Ward, aged 35, a policeman, is believed to be dying today in a hospital here. Harding is in jail, charged with assault to commit murder. According to the police, Harding claims to have found Ward in his home at 2 o'clock this morning. After the shooting Harding fled and was captured by police, aided by cowboys employed by a motion picture company. Ward was granted vacation leave by Chief of Police Randall yesterday. Harding is said to be wealthy.

MR. BRYAN ANSWERS GOVERNOR HARMON

Lincoln, Neb., May 14.—In regard to his controversy with Governor Judson Harmon, of Ohio, William J. Bryan today gave the following statement to the United Press: "I have read the press reports of Judson Harmon's speech at Wooster. He is misinforming on some points and evades others. "I did not offer to nominate him in the convention at St. Louis in 1904. On the contrary, I objected to his nomination. I did not promise him a cabinet position in the last campaign or any other campaign, or at any other time. "Harmon does not deny that he is the choice of 'big business.' He is not candid in discussing the initiative and referendum. He repudiated the pledges of two platforms when he advised the Ohio constitutional convention against the initiative and referendum. "Obtaining office under false pretenses is as reprehensible as obtaining money under false pretenses."

FORESTERS ARE IN SESSION AT PENSNO

Pensno, Cal., May 14.—With hundreds of delegates from all parts of the Pacific coast in attendance, the fifteenth biennial convention of the Pacific coast jurisdiction of the Ancient Order of Foresters opened its sessions here today. One of the first acts at today's session was the appointment of a committee to take charge of plans for the erection of a \$100,000 building in San Francisco, to be completed in time for the opening of the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915. The building will be owned by the Pacific jurisdiction, and will be headquarters during the exposition for Foresters from all parts of the world. The convention was opened by High Court Chief Ranger Frank W. Hogan, of San Jose. George W. Lunt, who has held the office of treasurer for the last 17 years, is the only candidate so far mentioned to succeed the late sub-chief ranger, J. J. Roberts, of Oakland. CIRCUIT COURT DECISION IS REVERSED

The supreme court today reversed the circuit court of Multnomah county in the case of John Clark vs. the City of Portland. This suit involved street improvements amounting to \$59,500 and the court held that because of the loss of time in winding up the street improvements by the city, the condemnation proceedings against Clark were void. In the case of the State of Oregon vs. The National Bank of Portland, the circuit court judgment was affirmed. This suit was instituted for the purpose of having escheat to the state of Oregon certain deposits made in the bank by persons who had not added or deducted from them for a period of seven years. The circuit of Multnomah was reversed in the case of John A. Sanders vs. the Peninsula Lumber company and a motion for a restraining order was denied in the same court in the case of Geo. M. Price vs. C. G. Younger.

THE OHIO CAMPAIGN IS GROWING WARM

Steubenville, Ohio, May 14.—Colonel Roosevelt addressed a crowd of 3,000 persons here at noon. He said: "The standpaters think seriously of your interests only on the Fourth of July. Yesterday President Taft called me an egotist. Three years ago he had not discovered that I was an egotist and a demagogue. I have not changed my position, but President Taft has changed his. My position is unaltered. "Aldrich and Penrose studied President Taft at close range, and they are for him. He is not the same as he was when he was in my cabinet—he no longer stands for the plain plain people."
