"Tis God gives skill,
But not without human hands."
In her hand every woman, even the plainest featured one, possesses a power that when developed and trained, yields a most subtle fascination. Yet many a woman who gives much time and study to the art of pleasing in dress is entirely unconscious of this endowment.

The human hand is such a wonderful thing that it alone should convince the atheist that only a divine power could have created it. The hand is to our thoughts what our face is to our emotions, giving expression and accent to them, and by gesture we often convey more meaning than by our words. The soul often speaks through the hand, when the halting tongue hesitates and leaves the word unspoken. By a thousand different positions, by countless attitudes of the fingers, the hand translates a great part of our thoughts and our feelings. It gives character to our words, it makes speech visible, and in an atmosphere of sublime harmony it gives glimpses of the soul.

Foreign peoples are more inclined to exaggerate the use of their hands in animated speech and gesture but it would be hard to find any women on the face of the globe who use their hands more eloquently and cleverly to point a moral, or adorn a tale than do some of America's fair daughters.

Lavater says: "The hand, whether in motion or repose, has an expression of its own that is not to be mistaken. When in perfect rest, it shows what are our traits of character, its flexions betray what are our actions and our passions." In all ages homage has been paid to the hand. Petrarch confessed that Laura's "beautiful hand made captive his heart."

Every movement of the hand is an index of the disposition and the ruling thought of its possessor. A hand, however awkward in shape, may acquire absolute beauty of motion by following the dictation of the brain, delicate in conception, and denying nobly the grosser instincts. Although the thoroughbred hand proclaiming the distinction of refined birth and breeding, is born with us, the ability

to use the hand effectively and to make of it a thing of wondrous fascination and charm is purely a matter of training and cultivation, within the reach of every woman of ordinary intelligence and perseverance. It is possible to acquire such skill and perfection in the use of the hands that you need fear no criticism; no one will know whether the form of your hand is beautiful or ugly.

The beauty of the hand is threefold, atrinity of power. The thumb is the thermometer of the will power; the palm, of the vitality; and the fingers, of the mental and physical force. There are more nerves between the brain and the hand than in any other portion of the system. Some scientists go so far as to declare that thought is impossible without the hands feeling its influence.

I was once told by a noted German scientist that if the brain became paralyzed, the palm of the hand became perfectly smooth, all lines leaving it that pertained to thought. Just six years later I happened to be living in the house of an elderly lady who was stricken with paralysis, becoming at once wholly unconscious. She lay in that comatose state for eight days before death came. On the fifth day, however, I remembered what the scientist had told me and upon examination we found that the palms of her hands were perfectly smooth, all lines had disappeared except the heart line.

Whatever may be the differences of opinion in respect to the claims of the advocates of palmistry, most people who have given the subject sufficient attention to enable them to form an intelligent opinion will agree that certain peculiarities of the hand, in form, development, and markings, do indicate, more or less accurately, certain traits of character. No less an authority than Job has declared that "God has placed signs in the hands of men, that every man may know his work."

The palm reader or traveling gypsy is rarely, if ever, a scientist or a student of character and because of this fact, the science of palmistry is not always recognized as being valid.

alacrity will the state endeavor to provide redress for those whose liberty has been wantonly violated.

"Our constitution and laws provide that the supreme executive power of the state shall be vested in the governor, and that he shall see that the laws are faithfully executed, and that he shall supervise the official conduct of all legislative and ministerial officers.

"It appears that the constitutional rights of certain people in the city of San Diego have been infringed, and in pursuance of the power that is mine, I shall direct the attorney-general of the state to proceed to San Diego that the laws may be enforced; that justice be done, that a solution of the problem confronting San Diego may be found and to give us hereafter the benefit of his knowledge and his experience, so that other localities and other cities may be protected. I wish him, as the chief law officer of the state, so far as he can, to afford redress to any who have suffered wrong and to mete out equal and exact justice to all."

San Diego, Cal., May 21.—If there is any demonstration by citizens at the court house tomorrow, as it was

reported today there might be, it will be against the advice of Senator L. A. Wright, attorney for J. M. Porter, accused in contempt proceedings growing out of the I. W. W. disturbances here. Wright today issued a statement to the public advising strongly against any such demonstration.

This is the statement made to the public:

"My attention has just been called to a proposed demonstration by citizens in front of the court house tomorrow morning at nine o'clock, at which time Judge Guy will proceed with the contempt proceedings instituted by F. H. Moore, attorney for the I. W. W.'s, against J. M. Porter. Any demonstration of this kind would be deplorable. It would be at once construed as an attempt to influence the court in its ruling. The attorneys for Mr. Porter have carefully examined the facts and the law and are convinced that the testimony will be ample to free Mr. Porter from the contempt charge.

"If it is desired to show the patriotism of the people of San Diego by a public demonstration in order to convince the world that we stand for law and order, such demonstration should be held at a time and place where it cannot be construed either directly or indirectly as an attempt to influence any cause or proceeding now pending in our courts." (Signed) "L. A. WRIGHT."

LAND COMPANY WAS A LOTTERY SCHEME.

(UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.)
Seattle, May 21.—Five indictments returned by the federal grand jury are still kept secret today. In all, 12 indictments were returned when the jury was discharged. W. A. Ridgeway and R. E. Glass, president and secretary of the Jovita Land company, were indicted on 22 counts for using the mails to further a lottery scheme.

Hazel Moore, the "woman who didn't care" and who, it is alleged, was responsible for the downfall of former Adjutant General Orin Hamilton, was indicted on a second charge of importing undesirable persons into this country. She pleaded not guilty, and was released on her former bond of \$2,000.

IT'S FIERCE FIGHTING IN MEXICO

Mexico City, May 21.—Great excitement exists among the American residents of the capital today over the news of fierce fighting which is in progress between 3,000 Zapatistas and 12,000 federal troops 15 miles from this city.

Couriers brought the reports of the battle into the capital, declaring that 200 had been killed and wounded when they left, with the battle still fiercely raging.

President Madero issued a call for volunteers when he heard the news, but the Mexicans inside the city refused to respond.

El Paso, Texas, May 21.—Federal troops occupied Escalon today, the rebels beating a hasty retreat. General Huerta's entire command is pursuing the fleeing enemy.

RAILROAD HAS TWO SETS OF RECEIVERS.

(UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.)
Seattle, May 21.—The Seattle, Renton and Southern Railway company, technically has two sets of receivers today.

The complication arose when the trustees of the company, holding \$1,500,000 stock of former President William Crawford as security for a loan of \$300,000, after successfully defeating Crawford's petition in the state court for a receiver by denying insolvency, the company went into the federal court and secured receivers of their own by alleging insolvency. Crawford then again applied to the state court and Judge Frater resumed jurisdiction.

W. W. Clark, M. M. Hill and Lawrence Blowers are recommended for appointment to succeed Judge Culbertson, of Hood River, who has resigned under fear of a recall.
