**CIGARETTES WERE FATAL IN HIS CASE**

Portland, Ore., May 29.—Apparently having ignited the bedclothing with a cigarette, Grover Preston, aged 30 years, was burned to death in a fire which originated in his room and caused damage of \$200 to the Burnside House here today. Either from intoxication or some other cause, Preston was unable to open the door, and was found huddled against it when firemen burst it open.  
Preston apparently had not been roused from sleep till the room was ablaze. Whatever attempts he may have made to escape, he did not cry out, and the firemen did not know he was in the room till they stumbled across his body when they battered down the door, and rushed into the smoke-filled room. He was lying on the floor, his body braced against the door, as if he had tried to burst open the door from the inside. His face was pillowed in his arms. The fire had burned off both hands.  
Preston was 30 years old, and was employed in a saloon nearby.  
Several weeks ago, it is asserted, he went to bed with a lighted cigarette in his mouth, the bedclothing catching fire, and he being rescued just in time.

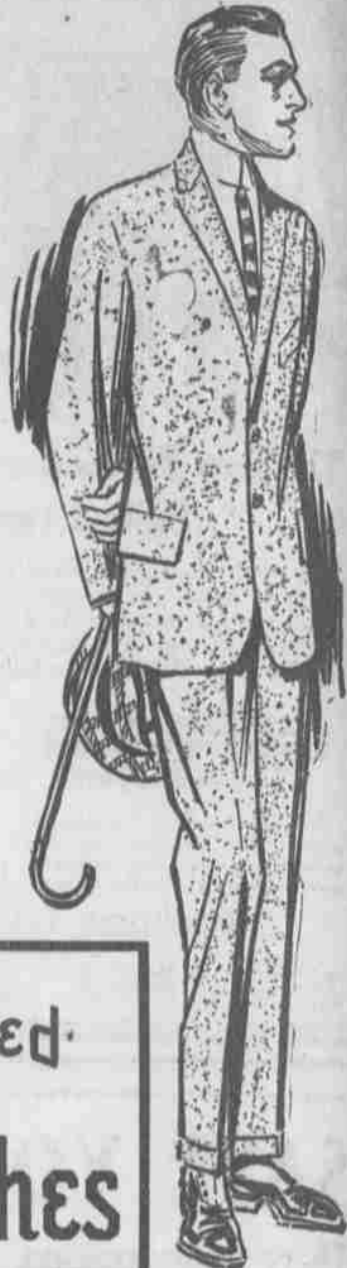

**REFUGEES ON TRANSPORT ARE NOT DESTITUTE**

San Diego, Cal., May 29.—That the American refugees on the United States transport Buford, due here late today, are not all destitute, as reported, was indicated in a wireless message to Mayor Wadham today.

Although a few are in need of immediate work, and penniless, it is believed that the majority do not need assistance. Of the 350 on board, only 18 men, nine women and 13 children are to be left in San Diego, the mayor's message says. One man with a family of six is in need of work at once, and this will be supplied. All will be quartered at the army barracks here, if they care to accept the hospitality of the city.

**REPUBLICANS ARE FIGHTING IN COLORADO**

Denver, Colo., May 29.—Insisting that the Evans-Guggenheim machine controlled the recent Republican state convention in Colorado through the Denver delegation, which was fraudulently elected, E. P. Costigan, chairman of the Progressive Republican faction in Colorado, today wrote to Chairman McDonald, of the Republican state committee, demanding the re-convening of the state Republican convention, the withdrawal of all instructions for President Taft and the reconsideration of the entire matter of electing delegates to the national convention.

Costigan declares that the alleged fraudulent election of the Denver

delegation vitiates the entire convention. The progressives threaten to send a contesting delegation to Chicago unless Costigan's demand is granted. Former Evans-Guggenheim leaders also are writing to McDonald demanding either the re-convening of the state convention or the holding of a presidential primary.

The progressives believe that Roosevelt may yet carry the state.

**TO PENSION DISABLED OR RETIRED MEMBERS**

Harrisburg, Pa., May 29.—Plans for the pensioning of totally disabled or retired members were adopted today by the convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The pension plan can be taken up or ignored by each local belonging to the Brotherhood as the various locals see fit.

Under the plan every individual member under 30 years of age must pay 50 cents a month for five years toward the pension fund, and thereafter \$1 a month. Those over 30 years of age pay \$1 a month for five years, and then \$1.50.
