## TERRIFIC FIRE RAGES IN FOREST

### SLOWLY DRIVING BACK THE RANGERS FIGHTING IT—THE FIERCE BLAZE SWEEPS INTO THE VIRGIN TIMBER OF BEAR VALLEY.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Bernardino, Cal., June 5.—Steadily forcing back a detachment of forest rangers, who battled its advance throughout the night, a terrific forest fire penetrated into Bear valley today, and is threatening the famous Pine Knot hotel. According to brief reports from the mountains at noon, a shift of wind direction only can save the building.

The fire is raging in a virgin forest, and unless checked may sweep thousands of acres of giant pines on both sides of Bear valley lake. Additional rangers will be sent to the scene.

## PORTLAND HAS BOILER EXPLOSION

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Ore., June 5.—One man was severely injured and the west-bound train of the O. W. R. & N. narrowly escaped being wrecked today when a boiler used in the construction of a bridge over Sullivan's gulch exploded. Wreckage of the engine and boiler was hurled across the track in front of the incoming train, and the engineer stopped the train barely in time to avoid a collision. The injured man was Bert Webb, engineer in charge of the work. A number of other persons were knocked down by the force of the explosion. One man was rained from the ground and deposited in a deep pool of water.

The Pender Murder Trial. St. Helens, Or., June 5.—Attempts today were made by the prosecution in the trial of J. A. Pender, charged with the murder of Mrs. Daisy Wehrman and her four-year-old boy to prove that the defendant, though although already possessed of a shotgun, borrowed a revolver on a pretext and that this weapon was the one with which the crime was committed.

Printers Elect Officers. Indianapolis, June 5.—The official vote in the recent election of officers of the International Typographical Association was as follows: President James M. Lynch, received 24,049 votes and Barker, 19,160. For vice-president Duncan received 21,437 votes and Tracy 20,593. John W. Hays was re-elected secretary-treasurer by a plurality of 4,723.

### UNCLE SAM LANDS MARINES.

(Continued from Page 1.)

The control of President Jose Gomez. The dispatches state that Captain Kline, of the Quantanamo naval station, has distributed the marines to guard American interests near that port, following the demand of the Americans for protection from the Cuban government, which they failed to receive. Consular reports from all parts of Cuba indicate that the revolution has reached proportions with which President Gomez is utterly unable to cope.

The rebels are threatening a general attack on American property around Santiago, it is reported, and marines probably will be landed from the cruiser Paduchah there this afternoon.

Pressure is being brought to bear on the administration here to land the entire 3,000 United States marines now in Cuban waters. Cuban minister Rivero conferred with Major General Leonard Wood, chief of the staff of the United States army, for an hour here today.

M. H. Lewis, president of the Guantanamo and Western railroad, informed General Wood and Secretary of State Knox today that the United States may protect the railroad or President Gomez will not have all his troops free to meet the rebels.
