**Two Extra Trains**—On account of the heavy travel over the Oregon Electric railway it was necessary to run two extra trains over that line this morning. If the will warrant it the company will probably run an extra train or two each day during the Portland festival.

**Complains as to Rates**—P. A. Snyder, a druggist of Prairie City, has complained to the Railroad Commission with regard to the price charged by the Sumpter Valley Railroad company for shipping drugs from Baker to Prairie City. He says that the company charges 75 cents per 100 pounds, and that, when compared with the rates charged by the Oregon-Washington Railroad company from Portland to Baker, that the charge is unreasonable.

**Postpone Hearing**—Because Dave Eccles, president of the Sumpter Valley Railroad company, has been summoned as a witness in the investigations being prosecuted against the sugar trust the hearing on the complaint against the railroad company by the Baker City Commercial club has been postponed. The hearing involves the rate to be charged on the transportation of logs for sawmills in the country surrounding Baker.

The suit is for the recovery of \$133,000, which the government asserts is the present value of the nine entries which Jones secured by fraud. The entries totaled 1440 acres, and were located in Cook county.
