

COLONEL STUDIES OUR LAWS

WIRES FOR COPY OF PRIMARY LAWS AND OTHER INFORMATION, AND WILL NO DOUBT PUT UP A FIGHT TO AGAIN CARRY OREGON.

Preparatory to the launching of his campaign in this state to be elected president of the United States through the party organized by him recently in Chicago, Theodore Roosevelt, has directed a telegram to the secretary of state asking that he forward to him copies of the direct primary and election laws, and also the Blue Book giving the canvass of the vote at the last general election, and a directory of the state officials.

Complying with the request, the secretary is forwarding to him all the necessary data. As the colonel carried this state at the primaries it is presumed that he will wage a vigorous campaign to again carry it at the general election.

TAFT WILL MAKE HOT CAMPAIGN

Washington, June 24.—President Taft is planning to break all precedents campaigning next fall. He will probably start in mid-September on a complete swing around the country, lasting almost up to election day.

Taft will take his family to Beverly July 3, remaining there himself until July 8, when he will return to Washington to discuss campaign plans with his political advisers.

CONFERRED BUT COULD NOT AGREE

Baltimore, June 24.—Seeking a solution of the threatened break on the temporary chairmanship of the convention Chairman Mack and Committeeman Hall, late this afternoon came to William Jennings Bryan with Judge Alton B. Parker, the sub-committee's choice for the chairmanship, hoping to compromise the fight. The Nebraska agreed to talk the situation over, and the four leaders went into conference in Mack's room at the Belvidere hotel.

The conference broke up at 5:15 o'clock, Bryan coming out of the room first leaving the other three within.

TIRE SOME U. OF O. CASE IS UP AGAIN

JUDGE GALLOWAY AGAIN DECIDES IT AND IT GOES AGAIN TO THE SUPREME COURT, OR THE UNIVERSITY WINS.

Fraud, and not the present monetary needs of the University of Oregon was what prompted Judge Galloway this afternoon to re-affirm his former opinion in the Oregon University referendum case, and it will go to the supreme court for final adjudication.

The supreme court reversed Judge Galloway's former opinion in the case on the ground that a taxpayer could not bring injunction proceedings to restrain the secretary of state from filing petitions asking for a reference to the people of two bills making appropriations for the institution on the ground of fraud. With the view of complying with this decision, Governor West directed District Attorney McNary to bring the suit in his own name, and the request was complied with.

Since then the regents of the university and the agricultural college agreed to initiate a bill making a millage tax the support for the two institutions. Fearing that to continue the case would jeopardize this measure, Governor West directed a letter to the district attorney to withdraw the case. This letter, however, never reached the district attorney, and West being out of town he was powerless to act.

The decision now makes it impossible for the governor to withdraw the case, and it will go to the supreme court if Secretary of State Olcott appeals, and if he does not then the university wins. Sweeping aside all technicalities, Judge Galloway rendered the decision on the basis of fraud. He declared that the need of the money by the university had but a slight bearing, as overwhelming all else was the question whether fraud could be committed by circulators in circulating petitions either to refer or initiate a measure.

MANY ARE PLEDGING SUPPORT

STATE AFTER STATE SENDS BRYAN WORD THAT THEY WILL BACK HIM IN HIS FIGHT AGAINST JUDGE PARKER.

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.] Baltimore, June 24.—The Pennsylvania delegation this afternoon in caucus voted 59 to 6 to oppose Judge Parker for temporary chairman of the convention should the national committee approve his selection of the sub-committee and a fight on the floor of the convention be precipitated by Bryan.

Baltimore, June 24.—Late this afternoon following a caucus, the Alabama delegation which is pledged to Underwood, tendered its support to Bryan in the event that the latter is forced to carry his fight against Parker to the convention floor.

A few moments after the action of the Alabama delegation, the Texas delegation sent a written protest to Colonel R. L. Johnson, the Texas national committeeman and member of the sub-committee on his vote for Parker for temporary chairman.

Chairman Cone Johnson of the state-delegates, signed the letter for the delegation asking Committeeman Johnson to change his vote and oppose Parker.

The Minnesota delegation at a caucus today pledged unanimous support to Bryan on any fight he may make on the temporary chairmanship. Chairman Mack and Delegate Hall of Nebraska, after having first started to see Colonel Bryan, then altered the plan, went to the Hotel Emerson for a conference with Alton B. Parker scheduled for 4 o'clock.

WANTS OVER A MILLION FOR ARMY MANEUVERS

Washington, June 24.—President Taft sent a special message to congress today asking for an emergency appropriation of \$1,350,000 to be available July 1 to pay the cost of the joint militia and regular army maneuvers which are to be held at various places in July. About \$80,000 has already been spent in preparation for the maneuvers and this sum will be lost unless the emergency fund is made.
