LACHMUND STANDS PAT ON SEWERS

For the mayor to refuse to sign a sewer contract and the council to authorize and direct one of its members to execute the contract is a very unusual procedure for a city council, yet this is exactly what was done last night when Mayor Lachmund announced to those in attendance at the council meeting that he would not recede from his former attitude favoring vitrified pipe as against concrete pipe, which was favored by a majority of the councilmen. The matter of awarding the sewer contracts for lateral sewer districts numbered 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20 brought on the war between the mayor and the council, which upon being put to a vote resulted in only one councilman, Townsend, voting for vitrified pipe.

Several weeks ago the question of the relative merits of the two kinds of sewer pipe came up for a lively discussion, resulting in the whole matter being referred to the sewer committee for an investigation and report. The committee, of which J. N. Skaffe is chairman, made an inspection of the plant of the Salem Sewer Pipe company, where the relative worth of the two classes of pipe was put to a test, resulting in the decision by the committee that cement pipe as manufactured in Salem was as good as the vitrified pipe. The committee so reported two weeks ago and the council directed the mayor and city recorder to enter into contracts with the E. W. Geiger Construction Co. to construct sewers in districts 15, 17 and 18 and to make contracts with George Gordon to construct those in districts 15 and 20.

The mayor refused to sign the contracts unless the manufacturers of the pipe would execute a bond for \$10,000 to indemnify the city in case the pipe should prove defective which the mayor held was likely on account of the experimental nature of its manufacture. The mayor stated definitely that he would not recede from his former position of refusing to sign the contracts, but that if the council saw fit he would be glad if it was deemed legal that some other person be designated to enter into the contracts with the contractors. He also indicated that he welcomed mandamus proceedings to compel the signing of the contracts. Councilmen Waring and White spoke championing the cause of the cement pipe, claiming among other things that as the cement piping was manufactured in Salem that it would be encouraging home industries by designating that kind of pipe. A long communication from the manufacturers of the cement pipe was read by the recorder in which a plea was made for its adoption on the grounds of it being a home product and that the plant where it was manufactured employed several of our own citizens. Mayor Lachmund branded the matter of home industry as a farce and a joke and until the merits of the pipe had been determined by actual usage, he was not in favor of adopting it. The question as to the legality of a contract signed by any other person than the mayor was put up to City Attorney Rollin K. Page, who expressed the opinion that such a proceeding would be legal, but he would be sorry to see such an action taken. Upon being put to a vote, Alderman Pennybaker and the city recorder were directed to enter into the contracts for constructing all five of the sewers.

Two unsuccessful attempts to adjourn were made while matter was under discussion.

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PLAYGROUND TO BE OPENED FIRST OF JULY

The Salem Playgrounds association starts off with fifty odd members and \$500 in the treasury—or to be more exact, \$500.75. The first playground will be opened Monday July 1st, and will be open six days in the week from 1:00 to 8:00 p. m. The work will start with the supervisor and three assistants. Paul Homan is recommended as assistant instructor in games and athletics for the larger boys. Miss Hayes, of the Salem schools, will handle the instruction in sewing and industrial work. Principal West, of the Englewood school, will be supervisor, and Miss Foster, or Miss Dimick, of Monmouth Normal Training school, will be director of games and folk songs and dances. The tennis courts and athletic grounds of Willamette University are placed at the disposal of the children. Following is a list of the members of the playgrounds association:

SOME STREETS ARE ORDERED SPRINKLED

A resolution was introduced at the council meeting last night by Alderman O. L. Townsend and passed, which provides for the sprinkling at the expense of the city of the following streets: South Commercial, Mission to south city limits; Broadway from Mill creek to Hood street; Market street from Liberty street to Sixth street; Sixth street from Market street to Fairgrounds road.

All of these streets are paved with macadam the sprinkling tending to a considerable extent in preserving the pavements as it serves as a binder to hold the gravel together. Sprinkling will also be greatly appreciated by residents on these streets as under present conditions they are very dusty.
